Growth in Grace

Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus. Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 3:12-14

HE TRUE CHRISTIAN WILL THINK THIS of himself:
Not as though I had already attained... He will
follow after conformity to Christ; he will never
forget that this is the object for which he has
been apprehended. Notice that where there is real
spiritual life, there is progress, from one state of knowledge and improvement to another.

Paul repeats with greater emphasis: Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended. He is not speaking of his justification before God, through faith in the right-eousness of Christ, for he plainly teaches that the righteousness of Christ, laid hold of by faith, fully justifies us. The apostle is desirous to see the life of his faith in Christ more manifested in his heart and life. To appear, therefore, complacent and self-satisfied with our attainments betrays the ignorance of Christ, and want of faith.

How many appear to suppose they have "already attained!" Take, for instance, *spiritual knowledge*. Many are well acquainted with the fundamental doctrines of the Gospel, are able to defend them, and have their minds stored with no small number of Scripture, psalms and hymns; we are glad to see them thus furnished. But a year afterward we find them just the same. Two years elapse, but still no progress can be perceived—they remind us of wood carved in the form of a tree, rather than a living production of nature, for there are no fresh shoots or new foliage—no expansion of the inward horizon, not a single addition to the treasury of Christian knowledge. "But," you say, "what more do we need to know?" Ah, there it is! You have completed the circle of your knowledge; as you suppose, you are already perfect and have already

attained. This is an indication of spiritual sickness, for if your souls were healthy, you would say, "Not that I have already attained." You would see the imperfection of your knowledge; you would believe that thousands of precious things still lay hidden in the Scriptures; you would investigate the holy writings with increasing interest. We should hear you exclaim, when we see you from time to time, "O, what precious things I have discovered in my Bible! What new and precious light has been given to me! What new and delightful views have I obtained of the glory and excellency of my Redeemer!" The more you grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord, the more valuable will the Scriptures become, and you will be convinced that you might continue to search in this mine all your life, without exhausting half of its treasures, and you will give more diligence to search further into the inexhaustible riches of Christ.

Every Christian should think of Christ for himself, as the Savior who loved me, and gave Himself for me!

The righteousness of faith ought to be continually our aim, not merely at the commencement of our Christian course. There are hindrances to our attainment of this vigorous state of personal Christianity; we are prone to forget the freeness of the grace of justification before God, through the merits of the Redeemer, as to fall back in some degree upon the covenant of works. We imagine some degree of holiness must be attained before we can rejoice in the free forgiveness of all our sins and our reinstatement in the Divine favor; whereas, it is entirely through our Lord Jesus Christ that God justifies the ungodly. Since our whole peace, comfort and strength depend on our belief of what we are and have in Christ Jesus, we need to constantly direct our endeavors after a full apprehension of the inestimable worth of Christ to our souls. What a blessing to feel that every desire after

Him is owing to His own previous love toward us, and to His gracious interposition on our behalf. Every Christian should think of Him for himself, as the Savior who loved *me*, and gave Himself *for me!*

What is this which Paul so desires? That with every experience that in the Lord Jesus he has all righteousness and strength, he may become more and more like Him by keeping His Word and conforming to His precepts and example. He forgets himself with respect to all he is by nature and birth, and all he had acquired by his own efforts. He is willing to be nothing in his own eyes—nothing but a poor needy sinner. He is not afraid to behold his own natural condition, for he knows that grace excels and repairs it a thousand times; he is much more afraid of the insinuating fancies of his own virtues and good works, because he is, once for all, resolved never to admit any other consolation into his heart than the divine one, that he is justified and complete in Christ.

Many have been tempted to spiritual pride, or else to spiritual depression, by the thoughts of their past experience in the life of grace. O how different does Paul appear in this respect! Still brighter attainments of the confi-

dence and joy of faith are the objects he keeps perpetually in view. He cannot be satisfied with beholding only a few glimmering rays of the divine glory; or with anything short of being ... changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord. (2 Corinthians 3:18) He saw the fairest days of his spiritual life lying before him. Compared with what was yet to come, all the past was only a foretaste.

Is not here a pattern that may well awaken our desire to grow in grace? What remains, but that we be found living in the same spirit that we may realize the same blessing, the same enjoyments? Put away from yourselves whatever hinders the free, joyful development of spiritual life within you. But as this can only be done by the principles we have endeavored to bring forward—as the love of Christ is the main stem, and faith in Christ is the root of all—keep these principles dearer to you than life itself. May God transplant us from the sterile soil of false legality and self-righteousness to the fruitful, well-watered soil of His own Gospel and under the breathing of His life-giving Spirit cause us to flourish, that we may be perfect in love, and "grow up into Him in all things, which is the head, even Christ!" ~

on's peace! In our youth we learn certain behaviors by being taught as well as by observing how people relate to us and with one another. Our parents instructed us in, as well as modeled, the type of behavior that they wished to instill in us and in our lives at an early age.

Sometimes we continue to do things without ever coming to understand why we do it. The Lord recognized this tendency in the life of His people, so He instructed them to be ready to provide the answer to the young ones when they asked why they do the rituals that they do in their worship of the Lord. The observance of the Passover pointed to the physical deliverance of their nation by the Lord from the slavery that they had been under in Egypt.

At times I am asked a similar question by people who are not familiar with a custom that has been handed down over the years in the Apostolic Lutheran Church—the handshake with the greeting of "God's peace." In response to this question, I usually point to the greeting that Jesus gave to His disciples after He had risen from the dead, appearing before them who were huddled behind closed doors in fear that perhaps they would be put to death next. They were afraid, but our Lord greeted them with these words: "Peace be unto you."

I go on to explain that because Jesus suffered our death, was buried and arose on the third day on Easter morning, by faith God was now at peace with humankind (Hebrews 11:6). Jesus desired the disciples to be the first recipients of this graceful greeting. Jesus was informing them that they had no reason to fear their God, for His wrath against sin was appeased. He was at peace with them. It was full of grace because Jesus desired that they would come to know and experience the fullness of the loving kindness and favor of God through Himself. Jesus came to gather people for His Father and we are called to imitate Him, through extending the peace of God to all we have opportunity to do so.

God's peace to you! May those words which are grounded in the grace of God through Jesus the Christ, and which come from the heart of our Father God, speak peace into your heart and soul today. ~

Never Alone

o one wants to be left alone. Sure, we sometimes like to get away and spend some time by ourselves, but no one likes to be abandoned. The fear of loneliness is one of the most powerful in human experience. Babies cry when their mothers leave the room. A teenager's worst nightmare is having to eat lunch alone. Neglected children will often misbehave, because even punishment for them is better than feeling abandoned. And, although locked away already, many prisoners still fear being thrown in isolation. While we experience it in different ways, we all know what it is like to feel loneliness, and it is one of the most painful parts of our existence.

This feeling of abandonment is at the root of many complaints against God about the evil of the world. Why do you put up with injustice and oppression? Have you just left us alone? The prophet Habakkuk called out many years ago: "How long, O LORD, must I call for help, but you do not listen? Or cry out to you, 'Violence!' but you do not save? Why do you make me look at injustice? Why do you tolerate wrong? Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and conflict abounds (Habakkuk 1:2-3)."

This year some good friends of mine had their first child. However, what should have been a time of great joy was immediately overshadowed by the news that he was born with a serious genetic illness. Requiring a great deal of medical care, he was unable to go home and was sent to the hospital in Toronto near where I live. I spent time

visiting over a period of several months as his loving parents watched him, prayed for him, hoped for his healing. While his dad worked long days and traveled back and forth several hours from their hometown to Toronto every week, his mom hardly ever left the hospital room, often sleeping on the end of the baby's small hospital bed. For eight long months, they watched their little one suffer. As he experienced one painful procedure after another, unable to understand the 'what' or the 'why' of his pain, his parents loved him, made tough decisions, and prayed for his life. Sadly, before his nine month birthday, his struggle ended as he died in the arms of his parents.

In the face of tragedies like this one, we want to cry out against God for not fixing things, or at least to call out and demand answers—why? But this experience reminded me again of one of the beautiful truths of Christian faith. Because, although he knew pain and suffering, that sweet baby, unlike any other person I've ever met, never knew what it was like to be left alone. And, the Christmas season reminds us that although we do not understand the 'what' or the 'why' of all of our pain, we are not left alone either. Our God is like a father watching over his children, like a mother longing for their healing and bearing their pain as if it were her own. This God does not abandon us to our fate, but has come among us, to be one of us, to experience the very depths of our condition.

It is costly for God to be with us in this way, just as it was costly for my friends to be so close to the pain of their child. But when you love deeply, you want to be with the beloved, whatever the cost. And since we live in pain, brokenness and sin, God's coming among us meant descending into the depths of that pain, brokenness and sin. Now, like that little one, we can be assured that we are never alone, that even when we do not understand the suffering in our lives, we do not bear it by ourselves. And even though my friends were unable to heal their child, this God promises ultimate healing and resurrection to all who will receive it. Like the angels announced, Jesus' birth is good news of great joy for all people.

The manger and eventually the cross are the supreme reminders of God's involvement and intimacy. When we turn to cry out in abandonment to God, we find ourselves face to face with a tortured, bloody man on a cross, in

whose death we are accomplices. Before we can even utter the words, we hear Him cry them first: "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" While we rarely ever know the answer to this question—'why?'—the very fact

that Jesus asked it is meaningful. It was not about information. Jesus knew more about the reasons for His suffering than most of us ever do. Information does not take away the pain anyway. However, if you believe that God has truly come to us in the person of Jesus Christ, then Jesus' anguished cry tells us something far important about God. Jesus' cry tells us that even in feelings of ultimate abandonment, we are not alone. The gospel message—that God has come among us—is absolutely transformative. There is no longer any place where God is not because this God has gone with us all the way. Even in the deepest moment of abandonment, we meet the one who is called 'God With Us.'

The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined... For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace.

Isaiah 9:2, 6

ROPHET ISAIAH WAS CALLED BY God at a time in history when the nation had experienced great prosperity and affluence but things were not going well for them. There was indifference, violence, corruption, fraud, abuses of power and immorality. They were worshipping idols and had forsaken the true God. The people walked in darkness.

When we are reconciled to God, this Light comes to live within us. He leads us into all truth. Jesus said, *I* am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me. (John 14:6) We become children that desire to do the will of God and shun evil.

The shepherds and the wise men rejoiced and glorified God when they found the Christ Child. When we possess the greatest Christmas gift ever given, the Lord Jesus Christ, we too can rejoice and praise God. We must be willing to share the good news and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear. (1 Peter 3:15)

Isaiah gives five titles to this Child:

- His name shall be called Wonderful. He is all in all.
 He keeps His church in His care. Not even the gates of hell can prevail against Him (Matthew 16:18).
- He is called **Counselor**. Truth comes from Him. His Word is truth. Do we lack wisdom? Ask Him!
- He is called the Mighty God. Jesus Christ is God, who was victorious over Satan, death and the world.
 He is God with us! Jesus said, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth (Matthew 28:18)."
- He is called the **Everlasting Father**. He protects us and preserves us. He will not fail us, nor forsake us. He is the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and end, the first and last. He intercedes for us before the Father.
- He is the Prince of Peace. He came to reconcile the world to God, to turn people from darkness to His Light, from the power of Satan unto God. He gives us peace through the forgiveness of sins.

These five names teach us that Jesus Christ is all in all and we can trust Him no matter what we face. He came as a Baby in the manger so we would not be afraid to draw near to Him. He leads us to the Father, for He is one with the Father (John 10:30)!

The world in Ignorance may try to remove all mention of Christ from Christmas, but the world will never succeed in destroying His power and the wonderful message of the forgiveness of sins in the name and blood of Jesus. HEN WE ARE BORN ANEW into the kingdom of

2 Peter 3:18

God, we become new born babes. When faith enters the heart, we begin to walk as God's children. We understand enough to believe and know that we are saved. Our Christian walk has just begun. We desire the milk of the Word in the beginning, but as we mature in faith, we are able to receive the stronger meat of God's Word.

The Bible gives us some examples of spiritual immaturity: And I, brethren, could not speak unto you as unto spiritual, but as unto carnal, even as unto babes in Christ. I have fed you with milk, and not with meat: for hitherto ye were not able to bear it, neither yet now are ye able. (1 Corinthians 3:1-2) That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive. (Ephesians 4:14) For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which be the first principles of the oracles of God; and are become such as have need of milk, and not of strong meat. For every one that useth milk is unskilful in the word of righteousness: for he is a babe. (Hebrews 5:12-13)

Spiritual growth comes from the studying of God's Word. As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby: If so be ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious. (1 Peter 2:2-3)

As we study and mature in Christ we grow in many ways. First, and most important, is that we grow in Christ. But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ. (Ephesians 4:15) It is important that we grow in Christ for He is everything to us. He is the One who has redeemed us with His atoning death on the cross at Calvary. He is the One who has risen from the dead and has conquered death and the grave. He is the One who has promised to be with us unto the end of the world. He is the One who said He will come again and

receive us unto Himself in glory. When we know this Christ as our Savior, we have everything.

We also grow in love, as Paul writes. And the Lord make you to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, even as we do toward you. (Psalm 84:7) But the path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day. (Proverbs 4:18) Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them; that thy profiting may appear to all. (1 Timothy 4:15)

There are signs that show spiritual maturity: When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things. (1 Corinthians 13:11) As we grow, we strive after Christ more and more. Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ. (Ephesians 4:13)

As we grow we are able to take the meat of His Word. But strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil. (Hebrews 5:14)

To continue to grow in grace and the knowledge of Jesus Christ, we must study His Word daily. We are encouraged to pray without ceasing. John tells us that we are to have fellowship one with another, and with God the Father and His Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. May we continue in unity to grow and uplift the name of our Lord. ~

In Memory of Jouko Valitalo

T WILL BE ONE YEAR ON November 1st when my brother Jouko was called home to eternity to be with the Lord. Jouko never lost sight of the prize that is promised for all who are faithful to the end. I still vividly remember the day when Jouko received the reassurance at the age of 15 that his sin load was lifted and he could believe all his sins forgiven in the name and precious blood of Jesus according to the Scriptures. At those services several of our family received the grace of repentance and the power to believe. It was special to hear Jouko exclaim the feelings of grace that the Lord had given him, which he was able to experience for several weeks as he felt the warmth of God overwhelm him.

Jouko's ministry started as soon as he had received the grace to believe. It was some weeks later that God called me also and Jouko was the one that proclaimed the Gospel unto me. At this time I was 12 years old. We were very close as brothers throughout our lives and I have many fond memories of him.

We had recently moved to Toronto, Ontario, Canada from Finland and as we held home services Jouko did the early translating as he was quicker to learn English. Jouko continued to serve faithfully as preacher in the Toronto congregation unto the end. Although Jouko was hesitant in speech he was bold in the Spirit and strong in the Word. He also actively served in the Suomi Koti holding services

and was instrumental in the Finnish community to get church services to the Finnfest that is held annually. He was called on by the other Finnish congregations to preach as well. Jouko's personal confession of faith sparked the interest of a professor to teach a course on the life of Lars Leevi Laestadius at the University of Toronto. This professor recognized that Laestadius was an influential person of Finnish history who had the greatest impact on people's spiritual lives.

As an adult Jouko's social life circled greatly around his family, church and spiritual matters. His wife Helena, his children: Monica, Stephen, Robert and Marianne and their families, his 10 brothers and sisters: Linnea, Liisa, Antti, Tapani, Leena, Matti, Laila, Helina, Hilkka, and Lilly and their families were always very close to his heart.

Jouko had a gentle heart for the less fortunate and was always willing to give of his time and substance. He left a solid testimony of his faith and we rejoice in his homecoming, but his passing leaves a big longing for him in the hearts of his family and friends.

The last night as he prepared for his final sleep he left his Finnish *Biblia* (Bible) open with his glasses in the middle page of Isaiah 45. Good night, dear brother.
