# **GREAT LOVE**

For as the heaven is high above the earth, so great is his mercy toward them that fear him. As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us.

Psalm 103:11-12

David was neither an astronomer nor a geographer, but he was certainly inspired by the Holy Spirit. Searching for some standard of measurement to express the magnitude of God's love, he compares it to the height of the heavens. Today we are in a better position to grasp the significance of these words than David was when he wrote them. Astronomers have told us about countless millions of galaxies, all far greater than the galaxy of which our sun is a part. The facts they have given are such that no human intellect can remotely comprehend them. So it is with the love of God. Over and above that which our finite minds can absorb, there remains a vastness beyond our power to imagine.

David goes on to picture the way God deals with our guilt: ...so far hath he removed our transgressions from us. How thankful we should be that David did not use as his standard the distance from north to south! That is a finite, measurable distance. But the distance from east to west is infinite. No matter how far eastward we may go, there is still just as far to

go as when we started. If we reverse our direction and go westward, the same is true.

That is how God deals with our guilt once He has forgiven us. He removes it so far from us that we can never again come near it. How foolish it would be on our part, then, to be troubled or condemned by what God Himself has placed forever beyond our reach!

## THANKFULNESS

And it came to pass, as he (Jesus) went to Jerusalem, that he passed through the midst of Samaria and Galilee. And as he entered into a



certain village, there met him ten men that were lepers, which stood afar off: And they lifted up their voices, and said, Jesus, Master, have mercy on us. And when he saw them, he said unto them, Go shew yourselves unto the priests. And it came to pass, that, as they went, they were cleansed. And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, and with a loud voice glorified God, And fell down on his face at his feet, giving him thanks: and he was a Samaritan. And Jesus answering said, Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine? There are not found that returned to give glory to God, save this stranger. And he said unto him, Arise, go thy way: thy faith hath made thee whole.

Luke 17:11-19

According to the Scriptures, lepers were to be separated from the people and to remain outside the camp of Israel. Leprosy was generally of such serious nature that it affected the skin and senses, even rotting away entire members of the body. The disease progressed slowly and caused terrible destruction.

Spiritually, leprosy is a picture of unbelief and the effects of sin. In this state a person becomes separated from the fellowship of faith, giving his members to the servitude of sin. It brings forth corrupt and bad fruits. It causes severance of ties with people, breaking up families and homes. It leads to bitterness, enmity and bad living habits. Truly a person has then become a slave of sin.

In our text, upon seeing Jesus, the ten lepers cried out with loud voices: Jesus, Master, have mercy on us. This was a prayerful plea, not only meant for healing from their disease, but also that He would pardon them. There have been occasions where God has, for instance, through sickness caused the awakening of a person's conscience. A prayer has arisen from the depths unto the heights: "Lord, have mercy on me." If physical healing was not given, this one received even more than that: the grace of repentance. He has received greetings from heaven in the audible Gospel of the kingdom of God. And God answered it with peace within the heart. It is remarkable that the same person has thanked God for the sickness through which the Lord brought awakening and an end to that course of life. He has led him in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake (Psalm 23:3).

The lepers were cleansed by the power of Jesus' Word. The sick who were healed, according to the Law of Moses, needed to show themselves to the priests who, upon examining them, proclaimed them whole. Jesus followed this rule. In the Christianity of Lapland it has also been taught. Johan Raattamaa so instructed a young preacher who had fallen into sin in the congregation of Enontekio. The young preacher went to Saivo, where Raattamaa lived, penitent and confessing his sin. Raattamaa indeed did proclaim the gospel of forgiveness to him, but

then told him, "Go now and show yourself to the priest in the congregation in which you committed the sin." He returned from where he had come and there continued his repentance; so he was also made free from the accusations of the people.

Of the ten lepers who were cleansed only one turned back praising God with a loud voice and falling down at Jesus' feet, giving Him thanks. And he was a Samaritan. Jesus answering said, Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine? We may hear of good tidings that someone in our own area has come into faith, but the Lord of the congregation may ask, "Where is he? Why has he not come to thank Jesus? Why has he forsaken the holy paths and fellowship of God's children?" The congregation waits and longs for him. "Where art thou? Have the streams of temptation and the winds of deception overcome and carried you along?"

The praise and thanksgiving of God is not only that of the mouth. When it stems from the heart it permeates the whole life and all that is within me (Psalm 103:1). The child of God is of the mind to worship God, so all his actions go forth in a sacrifice of praise, as Hebrews 13 tells us. By so doing we praise the works of God and all His benefits unto us (Psalm 103:2). Here in the midst of failures and faults we often experience, nonetheless, that we are so lax to offer thanks. The desire of our spirit is to thank Jesus with psalms and hymns and spiritual songs (Colossians 3:16). We desire not to praise the idols of our day, such as those presented by rock and pop music.

Jesus said: "Thy faith hath saved thee." God has provided for us, in His Son Jesus Christ, a perfect and everlasting right-eousness and salvation. Because of the sacrificial blood of Christ, we can believe ourselves to be children of God. The word of the Gospel kindles faith and through this faith we are possessors of the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation. By this means also the pearly gate is open to heaven itself. We shall truly give thanks when corruption is stripped away and eternal glory is clothed upon us.

With these words I desire to send greetings of love to the American friends in faith, brothers and sisters, from Europe, Sweden and Finland.

# **WHO AM I?**

**Dietrich Bonhoeffer** was a Lutheran pastor, theologian, and martyr. After a two-year imprisonment for his part in the German resistance movement against Nazism, he was executed in April 1945, only days before the Nazis surrendered to the

Allied forces. He was influential in prison, earning the respect of both his fellow prisoners and his guards, some of whom even smuggled Bonhoeffer's writings and poems out of prison, and who apologized when they had to lock his door after a walk in the courtyard. All were impressed by his calm self-control, even during the heavy bombings in Berlin. He had an amazing ability to comfort the anxious and minister to the sick in prison.

But this is only one side of the story. Bonhoeffer was also a man who lived in, and loved, this world. He longed for freedom and the return to his life before the war. He was calm and controlled before men, but within himself he acknowledged the fight between flesh and spirit, between Adam and Christ. His conflict is expressed in this poem written from his prison cell:

Who am I? They often tell me I stepped from my cell's confinement calmly, cheerfully, firmly, like a squire from his country house.

Who am I? They often tell me I used to speak to my warders freely and friendly and clearly, as though it were mine to command.

Who am I? They also tell me I bore the days of misfortune equably, smilingly, proudly, like one accustomed to win.

Am I then really that which other men tell of? Or am I only what I myself know of myself? Restless and longing and sick, like a bird in a cage, struggling for breath, as though hands were compressing my throat, yearning for colors, for flowers, for the voices of birds, thirsting for words of kindness, for neighborliness, tossing in expectation of great events, powerlessly trembling for friends at an infinite distance, weary and empty at praying, at thinking, at making, faint, and ready to say farewell to it all.

Who am I? This or the other? Am I one person to-day and to-morrow another? Am I both at once? A hypocrite before others, and before myself a contemptible woebegone weakling? Or is something within me still like a beaten army fleeing in disorder from victory already achieved?

Who am I? They mock me, these lonely questions of mine. Whoever I am, Thou knowest, O God, I am thine!

# **TESTIMONY**

The glory of the LORD shall endure for ever: the LORD shall rejoice in his works. He looketh on the earth, and it trembleth: he toucheth the hills, and they smoke.

Psalm 104:31-32

While visiting in New Hampshire, I heard a sermon on Psalm 104. When the speaker came to verse 32, I was quite taken aback. I do believe that from now on, I will look at earthquakes and volcanoes differently. They do not happen by chance. However, I also considered this a little differently, as we all live in a small part of earth called our earthly portion.

I remember quite vividly some 48 years ago when God began working in my own heart. I lived freely in the world, with no restraints from His Word. I did not know what it was like for God to work in the heart or conscience because I was not brought up in living Christianity or even among the Christians. I was born and reared in the world, so this was not at all amiss on my part. My parents repented when I was 13 and I was already deep in the world. I went to confirmation and did not continue with the church after that. A relative of Dad's came to visit and wanted to discuss his particular religion; we talked for some time. The next day, I realized that I knew nothing of the Word of God, only what was memorized from confirmation. I said a brief prayer and asked God to show me what it is to be a Christian, and I began reading the Word. He heard my prayer and looked on me. And I trembled. This went on for some time. I would read and cry and tremble. I continued reading for some time. Soon I could no longer open the Bible. I felt it was on fire and dared not touch it. I was sure I was losing my mind.

Finally, I called my mother and told her of my condition. I told her that I dared not sleep because, if I did not wake, I knew I would have to go to hell, still not understanding why or what my problem was. She sent for my dad to see me. When he arrived, I was quite distraught and upset. He asked what my problem was and I began expounding my sins. I still did not

understand what had happened. He assured me that my sins were forgiven and I did not have to go to hell. I felt better for only a little while. God was not done looking at me yet. When my parents returned three days later, I told them I couldn't greet with God's peace and didn't feel I had become a Christian.

When God looked upon me, He not only dealt with my outward sins, He created an earthquake. The more I trembled, the more I split. Cracks and crevices in my earth revealed more and more of me. Not only did I live in sin, I was sin. I could not be a Christian as I was. The *Song of Solomon 1:6* says, *Look not upon me, because I am black, because the sun hath looked upon me...* Yes, when God looks on us, we become black, knowing our sins and sinfulness.

And bring hither the fatted calf, and kill it; and let us eat, and be merry. (Luke 15:23) My father spoke to me of a Savior who loves real sinners and who are all sin, not just sinners that do some things wrong. He placed my feet of faith on Golgotha and the work of redemption accomplished for me. I was able to believe that if we are covered with the blessings of redemption through Christ Jesus, we are acceptable to God and our sins and sinfulness are all forgiven. Now even God can rejoice with the sinner. The Fatted Calf has been killed and we can now eat and be merry. I have depended on those promises all these years, as I still carry this sinful earth with me on my Christian journey and it still gives me much trouble, but God has been faithful in His promises, for which I am eternally thankful.

This is my prayer for my children, grandchildren, and now already great-grandchildren, and many children whom I have come to love, whom I would not want to see lost: God, be gracious to them all. Continue to look on this sinful earth that souls may be saved. In Jesus' name. Amen.

# **TWOFOLD TESTIMONY**


# Dear Children,

I hope this finds you all well and happy. The Christmas season as we call it is over, but is it? No, because we can remember Jesus' birth in our hearts every day. Christ's birth is truly a special time.

You have read about His birth and a little about Him growing up. Now I would like to tell you something that happened to Jesus when He was about 30 years of age. It is found in *St. Luke 4:1-15*.

# JESUS TEMPTED BY THE DEVIL

After Jesus was baptized, He was led by the Spirit of God into the wilderness. Here He spent forty days neither eating nor drinking, and He became very hungry. The devil came to Jesus in His hunger and tempted Him first with food. The devil thought



Jesus would surely want something to eat. The devil says, *If* thou be the Son of God, command this stone that it be made bread. (v. 3) Jesus tells him, *It is written*, *That man shall not* live by bread alone, but by every word of God. (v. 4) You can see Jesus is obedient to His Father, God, and desires to do His will and not listen to the devil.

Next, the devil took Jesus up into a high mountain and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world. He tells Jesus that he will give Him power over all that He sees if Jesus will worship him. Listen to what Jesus says to the devil, *Get thee behind me, Satan: for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve.* (v. 8) This is something you and I need to listen to and do also, right? We only want to serve God.

The devil then took Jesus to Jerusalem and set Him on a very high point of the temple (church). He tells Jesus that if He really is the Son of God, throw Himself down from the temple, as the Word says that God will send His angels to help Him and He won't get hurt. Jesus then says to the devil, *It is said, Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God.* (v. 12)

And when the devil had ended all the temptation, he departed from him for a season. (v. 13) We see that Jesus was victorious over the devil and we can be too, with God's help.

Jesus returned to Galilee. The people all around the area talked much about Him because He had such wonderful power. And he taught in their synagogues (churches), being glorified of all. (v. 15) Jesus was so holy at His birth that people bowed and worshipped Him. When He was older, they still glorified and worshipped Him because He is so holy. Oh, yes, Jesus is so holy and wonderful that we should praise His name and glorify Him in song, word and deed!

I pray that each of you will pray to God and ask Him to fill you with His Spirit and strength, so you will be able to be strong over the devil when he tempts you to do wrong. The things which they, as men, rule out as impossible, He plainly shows to be possible; that which they deride as unfitting, His goodness makes most fit; and things which these wiseacres laugh at as "human," He by His inherent might declares divine. Thus by what seems His utter poverty and weakness on the cross He overturns the pomp and parade of idols, and quietly and hiddenly wins over the mockers and unbelievers to recognize Him as God.

You must understand why it is that the Word of the Father, so great and so high, has been made manifest in bodily form. He has not assumed a body as proper to His own nature, far from it, for as the Word He is without body. He has been manifested in a human body for this reason only, out of the love and goodness of His Father, for the salvation of us men. We will begin, then, with the creation of the world and with God its Maker, for the first fact that you must grasp is this: the renewal of creation has been wrought by the Self-same Word Who made it in the beginning. There is thus no inconsistency between creation and salvation, for the one Father has employed the same agent for both works, effecting the salvation of the world through the same Word Who made it in the beginning.

# "SHALL" IN THE BIBLE

The word "shall" is an important auxiliary verb in the Bible that is often overlooked as to its true instructional value. At the time the King James Version was translated, it carried a stronger connotation than it does now. Today, there are even people who say the word "shall" should be dropped from the English vocabulary. Is it because they feel it is too harsh and they don't want to be guided by such instruction? Do they feel we should be able to do whatever we please in our lives without any restrictions? Probably!

In the dictionary the word "shall" implies a much stronger instruction to us than we sometimes want to acknowledge. It says the word is used in the second or third person, especially in speech or writing, to express determination, compulsion, or necessity. Two dictionary definitions of the word are:

# 1. Used to express what is inevitable or likely to happen in the future.

### 2. Used to express what is mandatory.

Strong's Concordance says "shall" is used 9838 times in the Bible. The word "shalt," which means the same thing, is used 1616 times. One important Scripture reference is the following: But ye shall receive power... and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. (Acts 1:8) The power referred to is the Holy Ghost, or Holy Spirit, which came upon the disciples shortly afterward on the day of Pentecost. Applying the two dictionary definitions above to the word "shall" in this Scripture, we can see that it is inevitable that a true believer will receive the Holy Spirit, and with this power, it is inevitable (even mandatory) that a true believer will be a witness to the world within their capabilities or means.

One might say that this instruction to be witnesses is legalistic in nature. But it isn't, really. If we, as true Christians, recognize what God has done for us through His Son, Jesus Christ, and what awaits us when we leave this earth, we will **thankfully** do whatever we can to support the spreading of the Gospel with our time, energy, and financial means. Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust

doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal: For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. (Matthew 6:19-21)

May the Lord our God, by the power of His Holy Spirit, motivate our hearts, minds, and spirits to do the "ye shall" of His command!
