FOR THIS CAUSE CAME I INTO THE WORLD

hese words, spoken by Jesus, are echoed and reechoed from pulpits throughout the world and yet they are so often dismissed by the stony, unrepentant hearts of men as merely rhetorical and without personal significance or meaning. It is for this very reason the world becomes more chaotic with each passing day. Unbelief reigns and controls men's lives. God's Word, which is truth, is rejected and we witness the sad results.

The world, since the fall of Adam, has been plagued with sin and unbelief. Paul writes, For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God. (Romans 3:23) We read in God's Word the dreadful consequence of sin, as the Apostle later in the same epistle writes, For the wages of sin is death... Not only did sin bring mortality unto men, but, even worse, it brings eternal separation from God to those who live in it.

However, the Apostle continues ...but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. (Romans 6:23) In these words we find God's plan of salvation for all who believe according to the Scriptures, and herein lies the true meaning of Easter. Jesus said, For God so loved the world, that he gave his

only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved. (John 3:16-17) The Lord Jesus still testifies today that men need not perish in their sins, For this cause came I into the world. (John 18:37)

If there is even one reader of these words of Jesus today who does not comprehend their meaning, may God, our dear heavenly Father, reveal them unto you. Jesus is telling you, dear friend, that it was for you, too, that He came into this world. He came to bring life and salvation to you and to all who will believe. He willingly took all your sins upon Himself, He willingly suffered in Gethsemane's garden beneath the burden of your sins, and He willingly allowed Himself to be nailed to the cross of Calvary. There He died so that you might live! It was on that first Easter morning that He arose from the grave victorious over death, hell and the power of the devil. In His victory, all who believe their sins forgiven in His name and precious atoning blood of reconciliation have the hope of eternal life according to His faithful promise.

Now we know that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law: that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may become guilty before God. Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in his sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin. But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested. being witnessed by the law and the prophets; Even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe: for there is no difference: For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus: Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God; To declare, I say, at this time his righteousness: that he might be just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus. Where is boasting then? It is excluded. By what law? of works? Nay: but by the law of faith. Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith without the deeds of the law. Is he the God of the Jews only? is he not also of the Gentiles? Yes.

of the Gentiles also: Seeing it is one God, which shall justify the circumcision by faith, and uncircumcision through faith. Do we then make void the law through faith? God forbid: yea, we establish the law. (Romans 3:19-31)

And you, dear fellow-traveler, who must journey here by faith; be reminded with me today of those sad and yet wonderful events which took place on that first Good Friday and Easter. Jesus loved us so much that while we were yet sinners, alienated from God by unbelief, He took upon Himself our sins. Our sin debt of ten thousand talents, which we could never hope to repay, was forgiven and we were set free.

No longer shackled in the bondage of sin, no longer a captive in the darkness of Egypt, no longer oppressed by the relentless taskmaster, but free indeed. We have been set free not because we were deserving, not because we merited liberty, not because we had earned the right through anything we had

done or not done, but, dear friend, it was because of God's unsearchable love for you and me.

Jesus once said to His disciples, *Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you... (John 15:16)* Think of it, dear friend! He has chosen you from the millions in this world to be His own! How humbling a matter this is when we consider how great a love He has for us. "Oh, the love that drew salvation's plan! Oh, the grace that brought it down to man! Oh, the mighty gulf that God did span at Calvary!" (William R. Newell)

May our hearts rejoice again this Easter time and each and every day to know that as our Savior arose victorious from the grave so shall we also be raised with Him on the last day according to His Word unto life eternal. He is the Alpha and Omega, the Beginning and the End, the Author and Finisher of your faith and mine. He is coming soon and His reward is with Him. To Him who has loved us and given Himself for us be all honor and glory forever and ever.

GOD'S GLORY

For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

2 Corinthians 4:6

The Bible teaches that it is by faith that we believe that our present world was planned and created by God. Through God's command, the light came, the world was formed, and everything was created. Without living faith in the living God it is impossible to believe this.



However, we believe that not only did God want the natural light to shine in our world, he also wanted the light of His Word to shine in our hearts. The Apostle John wrote that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. God gave His Word, His Son, Jesus, the same Word that was with Him creating the world, to mankind, to you and to me! But why? John also wrote in the same place: *In him was life; and the life was the light of men. (John 1:4)* That is, in God's Son Jesus was life. In Jesus is His plan of salvation—His plan of life for us. He wants us to come out of the darkness of sin and allow the light to expose us, to show us what we are. God wants our life to be focused on Him and His Son.

You may say, "What are you talking about? I am living, breathing, thinking, feeling. What is this talk of light and life? What more do I need?" We do need more. Paul tells us in his letter to the Romans that to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. If our life is dead, it is concerned only with this life, this world and its temporal satisfaction and pleasure. We do not see our own insufficiency, our own sinfulness. But when our life is spiritual—that is, controlled by God's Holy Spirit—we understand a need for a Savior. We remember God's instructions and promises. We remember that we need forgiveness for our sin.

Someone wrote a long time ago in the 119th Psalm, verse 105: Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path. We have been given God's Word to lead us and guide us. God is always faithful to us, but He wants us to be faithful to Him. He wants our obedience, not our sacrifices. God wants us to see the sacrifice that He prepared for our sins, not the ones that we sometimes think that we can offer. We see God's sacrifice in Jesus Christ. In the face of Jesus, we see God's glory. More than anything else God wants us to understand Jesus Christ and what He has done for us.

One day we will see God's glory face to face. The Apostle Paul wrote: For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known. (1 Corinthians 13:12) There is a day coming when you and I will stand before the face of our Lord and Creator. May we prepare ourselves now in time, so that we are ready for that moment when eternity will begin.

THE EPIPHANY OF OUR LORD

The Epiphany is the revealing of Christ's divinity and rightful position as the second person in the Trinity. He was conceived by the Holy Ghost and born of the virgin Mary, thereby being truly God and truly man. Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, separated unto the gospel of God. (Which he had promised afore by his prophets in the holy scriptures,) Concerning his Son Jesus Christ our Lord, which was made of the seed of David according to the flesh; And declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead. (Romans 1:1-4) This is God's own testimony of His only begotten Son after being baptized by John: And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water: and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him: And lo a voice from heaven, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased. (Matthew 3:16-17)

Jesus, in perfect obedience to the Law, walked on earth as the first perfect man, fulfilling all righteousness as the son of Adam. Then the fallen sons and daughters of Adam could be redeemed. Sin was committed in the flesh, and also atoned for in the flesh by the God-man dving in the flesh, shedding His precious holy blood for sinners condemned and unclean. For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin: that we might be made the righteousness of God in him. (2 Corinthians 5:21) Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; And deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage. For verily he took not on him the nature of angels; but he took on him the seed of Abraham. Wherefore in all things it behoved him to be made like unto his brethren, that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make reconciliation for the sins of the people. (Hebrews 2:14-17)

This revelation to the heart of a sinner works godly sorrow over sin, repentance toward God, and faith in Jesus Christ. Washed in the blood of Jesus, we are translated from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of God. When we are born again in Christ, Apostle Paul teaches: Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. (2 Corinthians 5:17) This gift of justification by Jesus Christ comes as a free gift, without any merit or worthiness on our part. It comes to us from a merciful God to sinners by birth and by choice. For we ourselves also were sometimes foolish, disobedient, deceived, serving divers lusts and pleasures, living in malice and envy, hateful, and hating one another. But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost: Which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour; That being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life. (Titus 3:3-7)

This is the message of the Gospel: there is life in Jesus' name and a sure anchor for the soul. *And this is*

the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life. These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life, and that ye may believe on the name of the Son of God. (1 John 5:11-13) What an epiphany when the grace of God in Christ Jesus is revealed to a sinner! God has called us, brothers and sisters, young and old, to proclaim the everlasting Gospel of Jesus' blood and righteousness. Proclaim it, preach it, teach it, sing it, herald the Word of life as long as there is breath. The seed is planted and God gives the increase. The time is short; Jesus is coming again!

Dear Little Children of God,

Once again it is that time of year when we remember what Jesus did for us when He died on the cross.

The little baby Jesus was born in a stable and was laid in a manger. God was always watching over Him; God protected Him from the ever-present enemy even in His wee toddler life. Jesus grew up, but we only know of Him when He was twelve in the temple and when He began His ministry at the age of 30.

Jesus walked among the people, healing, teaching, listening, and always caring for His own. As He became more well-known, some people followed Him because they liked what He had to say, and many with diseases or other ailments wanted to be healed by Him. Jesus did heal and comfort many. Some who followed Him were always looking to find fault with Him. These were the Pharisees, and they never left Him alone.

Do you remember, children, that Jesus had twelve special men He chose to help Him? He was always teaching them about Himself and His Father God. These men were called disciples (they were learners).

It was getting close to the time when Jesus would die and He gathered with His disciples in a room prepared just for them. Here they ate the Last Supper—the breaking of bread and wine together before Jesus would die. One disciple's name was Judas, and, before going to the supper, he went to the chief priests and Pharisees and asked them what price they would pay him if he led them to Jesus. The chief priests and Pharisees wanted to kill Jesus and they wanted Judas to take them to Jesus. Judas knew of the special garden where Jesus liked to go, and Jesus and His disciples would go there after supper. As Jesus sat at the supper, He passed the bread and, as they ate, they dipped their bread in a bowl. Jesus told them, "The one who dips his bread with Me in the dish is the one that will betray Me." This was Judas.

Jesus broke some bread and handed it to the disciples and said, *Take*, *eat*; *this* is *my* body. Then He passed the wine and said, *This* is *my* blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins.

Jesus and the disciples (except Judas, who had gone to find the priests and collect his money) went to the garden of Gethsemane where Jesus spent time in prayer with God, praying for strength as He knew it was His time to die. While they were there, Judas came with the men who wanted Jesus dead and they took Him away to be crucified.


Jesus had to stand before a judge who asked Him questions; Jesus answered with the truth, which angered the people. The crowds that had gathered wanted Jesus dead, too. It really made them angry when Jesus said that He was the Son of God. The judge asked, "What do you want me to do with this man?" The crowds shouted, "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!" Jesus was beaten, spit on, slapped and made fun of; He bore it all quietly.

THE BARREN FIG TREE

Now in the morning as he [Jesus] returned into the city, he hungered. And when he saw a fig tree in the way, he came to it,

and found nothing thereon, but leaves only, and said unto it, Let no fruit grow on thee henceforward for ever. And presently the fig tree withered away. And when the disciples saw it, they marvelled, saying, How soon is the fig tree withered away! Jesus answered and said unto them, Verily I say unto you, If ye have faith, and doubt not, ye shall not only do this which is done to the fig tree, but also if ye shall say unto this mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; it shall be done.

Matthew 21:18-21

The barren fig tree, figuratively speaking, depicts the nation of Israel, which displayed an abundance of greenery but bore no spiritual fruit. There was ample godliness in Israel, but as a nation it lacked living faith. This can also be applied to Christendom at large, but our focus will be on the spiritual aspect which involves the individual and concerns every one of us, because we, like the Israelites, are inclined to confuse the green leaves—godly works—with the spiritual fruit—living faith. The leaves are tangible and readily perceivable, but the fruit, when present, is hidden among the leaves and is spiritually discerned.

We must bear in mind that a productive tree is sustained by nutrients from two different sources: the sugars, which are provided by the leaves, and the minerals, referred to as the salts, which are provided by the roots. The first is affected by climatic conditions and the latter by ground conditions. Together, they provide the nutritional balance needed for the cellular growth of the tree, as well as the developing of the fruit buds and maturing of the fruit.

Applied to Israel, the abundance of leaves reflects ideal climatic conditions. Grace—the supply of sugars—was more than adequate for bearing an abundance of true spiritual fruit. However, since its roots were not established in the Word of

truth—the supply of minerals—but set instead in the traditions of men, the effects of grace were merely superficial, producing only leaves. Therefore, the benefits of grace, as a nation, were temporal rather than eternal.

As a result of the hypocrisy, Israel ceased being a great godly nation, a status it once enjoyed. The wilting of the fig tree is a depiction of its demise. We can see the same thing happening to Christendom and the demise is clearly evident already here in our beloved America, and for the very same reason.

When the depiction is applied spiritually, the individual is the tree. In this sense, the matter of bearing fruit is brought so close to us that none of us can evade the issue. God requires spiritual fruit on a individual basis, as John the Baptist warned the people of his day: ...the axe is laid unto the root of the trees: therefore every tree which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. (Matthew 3:10) If the truth is circumvented in this time of grace, the same truth will cut us down and condemn us eternally, at the time of death. Hopefully, this will happen sooner and bring us to our senses while there is yet grace, so that the situation could be remedied.

Though God requires spiritual fruit, it can only happen when our roots are firmly established in the Word of truth, for no amount of external pressure can bring forth true spiritual fruit. The opposite is true when it comes to bearing leaves, because leaf-bearing is greatly influenced by external pressure, since it is subject to climatic conditions. The greenery may well be enhanced by the whip of the Law, but this only adds to the problem when greenery is confused with fruit. This confusion is among the leading causes of the problems within the church.

For many generations here in America, we, like the Israelites, have enjoyed the most favorable climatic conditions for bearing spiritual fruit, especially those of us who have been reared in Christian homes. We have enjoyed the benefits of grace: the remission of sins, the warmth and security of the church, the fellowship of believers. This has provided a favorable environment wherein we have come to know the will of God, and the sayings of Jesus Christ and His mission. The sugar provided by the leaves has been more than adequate, and we have enjoyed these benefits because they are readily compatible with our natures.

But what about the unsavory minerals provided by the ground, which are also vital to life but are contrary to our natures because they involve self-denial? Has this been our concern, or are we preoccupied by the leaves, as were the Israelites? Our flesh glories in the quantity and greenness of the leaves because our own righteousness is magnified, rather than the righteousness of Jesus Christ. Christ is glorified when we are concerned with the condition of the ground and our roots, with Christ and His redemptive work in our behalf, and when we reach out by faith and appropriate it unto ourselves and receive it as being sufficient for our salvation, without adding any of our own works.

This is not to say that bearing leaves is undesirable. Surely not!

If we are in the truth, the leaves will appear spontaneously and in the proper proportion...

Only that over-production is undesirable. In regard to this, James clearly states, "Faith without works is dead." Leaves are absolutely essential for bearing spiritual fruit, as for natural fruit. The balance (moderation) is the concern here. We need to be attentive so that the growth of foliage does not overwhelm the growth of fruit. As demonstrated by the wilted fig tree, the over-production of leaves can be fatal, because it is the result of a severe nutritional imbalance which may not be reversible.

Over-production can be fatal if we are overly concerned about good works, even those deemed vital to Christianity, such as personal appearance, conduct, and various church-related activities and functions. A prime example is mission work. Although scripturally mandated, it is an issue associated with the leaves. Therefore, it needs to be kept in proper perspective, lest it become a diversion and a mere show of good Christianity. If our attention and energy are devoted to outward acts of good works and these move to the forefront and become our preoccupation, we are in serious trouble, because the matters of the heart which directly concern life and involve the minerals move into the background and eventually become non-issues. When this happens, we become alienated from the truth. Unless we come to our senses while the condition is still reversible, we will become like that fig tree and suffer the same fate eternally.

Our main concern needs to be whether our roots are firmly established in the truth of the Word. If we are in the truth, the leaves will appear spontaneously and in the proper proportion, though the quantity and greenness will vary among individuals, as will the quantity of fruit.

A periodic pruning will also be necessary to keep the foliage in proportion to the trunk and roots, so our godly zeal, which manifests itself as good works, will not overwhelm the fruit that is being instilled within us through the hearing of the Word. God has His own way of accomplishing this through His Word, but it will not be to our liking since it involves the unsavory minerals, which is essentially a chastening. The writer of Hebrews makes known: *Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby.* (Hebrews 12:11) The peaceable fruit of righteousness is living faith.



LONG AGO LETTERS FROM CHILDREN





Dear boys and girls:

I am 11 years old and attend the Apostolic Lutheran Sunday School in Centerville, Wash.

I believe in Easter because Jesus died on the cross to save sinners. Before Jesus was taken, He was praying at the Mount of Olives. After a while He saw a group of men coming toward Him.
