


## Serving God and Country

### **PRECIOUS PROMISES**

s you recall from the book of Esther, evil Haman—out of selfishness, pride and arrogance—seduced King Ahasuerus into issuing a decree to destroy all Jewish people. However, God used King Ahasuerus, Queen Esther and Mordecai (Esther's uncle) to reverse all that Haman had done.

One night when King Ahasuerus was troubled and could not sleep, he had the royal records read and discovered that Mordecai had exposed a plot to murder him. Therefore, the king wanted to honor Mordecai and he had Haman parade Mordecai through the streets wearing the king's royal purple apparel and had him ride on the king's horse. Haman was so humiliated by this he covered his head and returned home. When Haman told his wife and friend what had happened, they made a prophecy. And Haman told Zeresh his wife and all his friends every thing that had befallen him. Then said his wise men and Zeresh his wife unto him, If Mordecai be of the seed of the Jews, before whom thou hast begun to fall, thou shalt not prevail against him, but shalt surely fall before him. (Esther 6:13)

In the book of Esther, Haman is a spiritual picture of our enemies: the devil, the world and our own flesh. We can be sure that these enemies are still

unable to prevail against those who are the seed (offspring or descendants) of the Jews.

## Is this promise for us? Are we of Jewish descent?

Is this promise for us? Are we of Jewish descent? You may say, "I'm certainly not a Jew, since I wasn't born in Israel and I don't have Jewish parents." However, Apostle Paul declares that when we acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord, we are indeed Jews. For he is not a Jew, which is one outwardly; neither is that circumcision, which is outward in the flesh: But he is a Jew, which is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the spirit, and not in the letter; whose praise is not of men, but of God. (Romans 2:28-29) He also declares that we are the seed of Abraham (father of the Jews). And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise. (Galatians 3:29)

Why is it important to be the spiritual offspring of the Jews—or Abraham's seed? Because a promise was given to Abraham by God: That in blessing I will bless thee, and in multiplying I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore; and thy seed shall possess the gate of his enemies; And in thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice. (Genesis 22:17-18) Since we are spiritual descendants of Abraham, we have the privilege to be heirs to the very same promise and blessings given to him.

Paul also explains it another way by using a natural picture: And if some of the branches be broken off, and thou, being a wild olive tree, wert graffed in among them, and with them partakest of the root and fatness of the olive tree... (Romans 11:17) We that were like a wild olive branch (Gentiles—not Jews) have been grafted into the root (Jesus Christ); that is, we have been joined to Christ and He provides and gives everything to the branches.

In the end, Haman met the same fate the devil will meet: destruction. Haman was hung on the very gallows where he personally planned to have Mordecai hung. The devil attempts to entice us by offering us his own promises (twisting God's promises). However the devil is subdued and will ultimately be destroyed (judged) by the very same Word that he twists.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, we still have this prophecy and promise 2500 years after it was recorded. Let us continue on in faith, firmly believing in this promise: evil cannot prevail against God's chosen people. Then with all boldness we can declare: we are bound for the Promised Land.



#### CORNELIUS

In 1524, Erasmus of Rotterdam wrote a book refuting Luther's stance on the will of man called *The Freedom of the Will*. In the book, Erasmus contended that Cornelius the centurion did good works without the Holy Spirit which pleased God and prepared him for grace (Acts 10:4). Luther answered Erasmus the following year with his famous *On the Bondage of the Will*. Luther countered:

I, too, have read Luke on the Acts, but I have never found a single syllable to suggest that Cornelius' works were morally good without the Holy Spirit, as [Erasmus] dreams. On the contrary, I find that he was "an upright and God-fearing



man"—for that is what Luke calls him (Acts 10:22). But to call a man without the Holy Spirit "upright and God-fearing" is the same as calling Belial "Christ."

Moreover, the whole argument there turns on the fact that Cornelius was clean in God's sight, as is shown by the vision sent from heaven with its rebuke to Peter; and it is obvious from the importance of what is said and done that Luke is making a special point of the uprightness and faith of Cornelius. Nevertheless [Erasmus and his] sophists are blind to all this, and though their eyes are opened and the words could not be clearer nor the facts more evident, they see just the opposite; so careless are they in their reading and marking of Holy Writ, which they then have to brand as obscure or ambiguous. Granted he was not yet baptized and had not yet heard the word concerning the risen Christ, does it follow from this that he was without the Holy Spirit? In that case, you will have to say that John the Baptist and his parents, and even Christ's mother and Simeon, were without the Holy Spirit. But let us take our leave from such deep gloom.

Luther says further concerning the condition of Cornelius in his *Lectures on Galatians*:

Cornelius was a just and holy man in the Old Testament, because of his faith in Christ which was to come, as all the fathers, prophets and godly kings in the Old Testament were righteous, having received secretly the Holy Ghost through faith in Christ to come. But the popish sophisters put no difference between faith in Christ to come, and in Christ which is already come. Wherefore if Cornelius had died before Christ was revealed, yet had he not been damned, because he had the faith of the fathers, which were saved by faith only in Christ to come (Acts 15:11).

Luther concludes his explanation on faith in a coming Christ:

For seeing that Christ is now revealed, we cannot be saved by faith in Christ to come, but we must believe that He is already come, has fulfilled all things, and abolished the law [in justification]. Therefore necessary it was also that Cornelius should be brought to another belief, not that Christ was yet to come, as he believed before; but that he was already come. So faith gives place to faith: "from faith to faith" (Romans 1:17).

### TIME FOR GOD

And ye shall be hated of all men for my name's sake.

Luke 21:17—Please read Luke 21.

When you read the Old Testament prophets and the psalms, some words bring about questions. There are words that do not seem to fit with the things being said. For example, we are reading a psalm about peace, safety and comfort and then the psalmist talks about how their enemies are closing in on them from behind and before. How often do we see the prophets speak in terms of destruction and despair? I believe they were both writing and speaking because their faith was in God and not in this world. Their words may seem out of place at times but the people were reliant on God. As we read through the Word, we find that the Word reveals how foreign the thoughts and intentions of God are in this world.

With that in mind, we, who are called by God, are strangers here in this world. The people who put their faith in the things of this world are left meandering around looking for purpose in themselves and others rather than in God. When God is brought up, anger ensues and lashing out comes at the speakers of truth. Thus, we see the brutal treatment of the prophets and ultimately of the truth itself, Jesus. This life will not be easy and we need to stop trying to accomplish things alone; God is calling us to Himself. We hear Him and we know He speaks to us through the Word, yet we move forward and disobey. We go everywhere else and neglect to stop and plead on behalf of others as the psalmist did amidst certain death. Do we believe the Lord is truly with us or do we just say that He is so people will think we are Christians?

The words written above in the Gospel of Luke are words spoken by Jesus to His disciples to prepare them for the things to come. Do we truly recognize that WE ARE His disciples? He calls us unto Himself and promises that He will give us the words to say when needed and that He will deliver us. Yet, we walk away time after time because we think we know better. Understand this: Jesus said, "People will hate you because of Me!" Jesus said these words to warn us all of the fear and rejection of His name by many. When truth is placed in any

form other than in God, it is a lie. We could argue the semantics of this but truth is from the Lord and we learn this truth by reading the Word.

Jesus goes on to say that many things will happen in the last days but not a hair on your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your lives. The destruction of Jerusalem was near and when that happened many people probably thought it was the end of the world. Wars have come and gone that made it look like hell on earth, yet we continue on. We cannot become complacent and act like Christ's return is not going to happen soon. If we believe this, then we will find that we are only relying on ourselves and the world, and not on God. This is the subtle nature of sin: self-reliance. The prophets of old and the psalmist found themselves in trials. What did they do? They cried out to the only one who would listen: God.

When we live in truth, the Lord will live in and through us and many will not understand. I am not saying that we should separate ourselves from the world but rather we should unite with the world as Christ did in love and service toward others. How often do we cry out to God for others? How often do we stop and just call out to God regardless of the situation? Jesus said, "Many will hate you on account of My name." This is not said to scare us but, rather, to show us that this world is not our home. We can't begin to understand the trials of the Old Testament prophets. We also cannot begin to understand what happened to Jesus and His disciples, but we can cry out to Him for guidance daily, for when we stop calling out to God, we will be living in times far more difficult than the days of the Bible.

I pray that this is a time for God to call His people to Him anew and I pray that, through the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the Word, we will hear Him.

losing remarks of a letter or message sometimes can be overlooked. We have heard the contents of this letter and have taken note of them. We try to conform or use the information to better ourselves, and this is good. But Paul here would not leave to us just a list of marching orders. He knows how important it is that everything he has written in the letter must be shored up with a foundation that will stand in the testing of the future. He gives us five imperatives. They are given to protect us from falling away from the faith. I have used some thoughts from RCC Lenski, from his commentary on this passage of Scripture.

Paul would have us be watchful. We must keep our eyes open and be on guard so that we would not be surprised by the things that would erode our faith.

We are to stand fast in "the faith," not like a dead post driven into the ground but like a tree that has roots and lives.

We are to act like men. This attribute of men is used for all of us. Men, women and children are to live this way. We can take our place in the family of God with the assurance of one who would not give the enemy any quarter to destroy our faith.

Be strong; show strength! We are not helpless in this faith. We are offered all that we need for the walk of faith. Our bodies need food and water to be able to continue doing our tasks. So, too, have we been given the nourishment for our faith.

Keeping "the faith" requires watchfulness, firmness, manliness, and strength. But it also requires love. This fruit always comes after faith. Never separated, but always following faith, is love. Faith produces love; not the opposite.

God bless us and give us these attributes to keep us walking in faith. This faith has an object, and it is Christ Jesus Himself.


#### THE SUN AND THE MOON STAND STILL

Joshua was the judge of Israel and he and his army had been fighting many battles. They were now camped in Gilgal, near the city of Gibeon, which had made friends with Joshua and the host of Israel. The last battle they had fought was against a very great city. When the king of Jerusalem heard how Joshua had destroyed that city, he was afraid and set to fight against him. This king gathered four other kings beside himself, along with their men of war, and went up and camped near the city of Gibeon to fight against it. These kings did not like that the Gibeonites had made friends with Joshua. The men of Gibeon heard that these five kings of the Amorites were ready to go to battle against them and they called on Joshua to help them.

Joshua did not wait. He gathered all of his men of war and went to the people of Gibeon. God spoke to Joshua and said, Fear them not: for I have delivered them into thine hand; there shall not a man of them stand before thee. (verse 8)

Joshua and his men fought all night and with the help from the Lord they killed many of the kings' armies that day in Gibeon. Joshua's army chased the other kings' armies and along the way the Lord made hailstones fall heaven and many died. ...they were more which died with hailstones than they whom the children of Israel slew with the sword. (verse 11)

The battle was not over and the Lord said not a man of the kings' armies would be left standing, but Joshua felt the need to ask God for help. Then spake Joshua to the LORD in the day when the LORD delivered up the Amorites before the children of Israel, and he (Joshua) said in the sight of Israel, Sun, stand thou still upon Gibeon; and thou, Moon, in the valley of Ajalon. And the sun stood still, and the moon stayed, until the people had avenged themselves (were satisfied with their battle) upon their enemies. Is not this written in the book



of Jasher? So the sun stood still in the midst of heaven, and hasted not to go down about a whole day. (verses 12-13) Joshua asked God to keep the sun and the moon in the sky all day so they would have light to see for fighting. God heard Joshua and did just that.

Could you imagine what it would be like to have the sun and moon stay in one

place all day? God is most powerful and these things are easy for Him to do. He was there to help Joshua; He saw that Joshua trusted in Him and it pleased Him to help. God did not need Joshua's help to win this battle, but Joshua needed God's help.

The *14<sup>th</sup> verse* says there never was a day like this one, not one before and not one after, where God listened to the voice of man and fought for His people, Israel.

And all these kings and their land did Joshua take at one time, because the LORD God of Israel fought for Israel. And Joshua returned, and all Israel with him, unto the camp to Gilgal. (verses 42-43)

So Joshua and his men were victorious and overthrew the Amorites, but it really was the Lord's victory.

When we walk as Christians on this earth, it is as though we are always in a battle against the enemy, the devil, and when we need to tell him to get away from us, we can call on God and He will give us the strength to be victorious, too.

Remember, children, that God does not need your help to overcome the evil one, but we always need His help. Pray to God when you don't feel strong and or when you feel the devil telling you to do something you should not do, and God will help you. God always hears your prayers and has promised not to leave you. God loves you—don't ever forget that.

## SIGNS OF THE LAST TIMES

God's Word gives many precious instructions for His children who live in this evil world, especially during the end times. Jesus, our Lord and Savior, explains how it will be in the last times: For then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, no, nor ever shall be. And except those days should be shortened, there should no flesh be saved: but for the elect's sake those days shall be shortened. Then if any man shall say unto you, Lo, here is Christ, or there; believe it not. For there shall arise false Christs, and false prophets, and shall shew great signs and wonders: insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect. Behold, I have told you before. (Matthew 24:21-25) Earlier Jesus said: And many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many. And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold. But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved. And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come. (Matthew 24:11-14)

When Apostle Paul was on his way to Jerusalem for the last time, he called the elders of the church of Ephesus and spoke these serious words to them: For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God. Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood. For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock. Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them. Therefore watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn every one night and day with tears. (Acts 20:27-31)

Here, Apostle Paul manifests a sign of a true servant of the Lord when he, in love and by the enlightenment of the Spirit, was constrained to warn the elders in Ephesus. These warnings are also part of the Gospel message. It is written: For we are not as many, which corrupt the word of God: but as of sincerity, but as of God, in the sight of God speak we in Christ. (2

*Corinthians 2:17)* A false prophet will not warn the people, but will rather minimize the Word of God.

The question for us today is: how can a believer know these false teachers which arise to deceive the children of God? Apostle Paul gives this instruction: And we beseech you, brethren, to know them which labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you. (1 Thessalonians 5:12) "To know them which labor among you" means to know their understanding of God's Word, especially important doctrines, such as the way of salvation regarding how a person is born again. Before Jesus ascended to heaven He spoke to His disciples: ...Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And ye are witnesses of these things. (Luke 24:46-48)

# Beware of false prophets...

There are many today who speak of repentance and have precious exhortations about how a person should live in this life, which are important

to take heed of from the Word of God; but there are few who preach the remission of sins as taught by Christ. John, the Apostle of Love, gives a serious exhortation concerning this matter: If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: For he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds. (2 John 1:10-11) Therefore, before we support and promote anyone in their preaching, teaching, or writing, let us get to know them in their doctrine and life.

Jesus also gives this warning about false prophets: Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves. Ye shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles? Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them. (Matthew 7:15-20)

One of the many signs of a child of God is that a person desires to love and uphold all of the teachings of God's Word, especially the doctrine of how a person can be saved, which is so important to understand. While we must always uphold the truths of God's Word, we must also remember that we do not have the authority to judge the condition of any person's soul. God has kept that responsibility for Himself.

When we see these difficult times approaching, it is important for us, as children of God, to believe and take comfort from the Word of the Lord: Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee. Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me. (Isaiah 49:15-16) Jesus said: ...and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. (Matthew 28:20) Notice the words "continually" and "alway" and be strengthened by His promises.

Pray for those who labor in God's kingdom that they would be faithful to God's undying Word, minister to His glory for the salvation of souls and, in the end, receive the crown of life.

# WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR? LUKE 10:29

What is meant by our neighbor we cannot doubt; it is every one with whom we are brought into contact. But, beside these, as our Lord teaches, it is every one who is thrown across our path by the changes and chances of life; he or she, whosoever it be, whom we have any means of helping—the unfortunate stranger whom we may meet in traveling, the deserted friend whom no one else cares to look after.
