John 14:6

n the past as we considered our status with God, being convicted of our sins by the enlightenment of the Holy Spirit, we became beggars of His grace. This is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent. (John 17:3) For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. (Colossians 3:3) How has it been since then? Have we become so much better that perhaps we aren't in need of God's grace as much? My experience, even as Apostle Paul's was, is that I feel I am a greater sinner in need of more grace. For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. (Romans 7:19) The fact of the matter is that we always were great sinners from day one, but we were not fully aware of it. As life goes on, the Holy Spirit magnifies in a greater measure the depravity of our flesh. Apostle Paul cries out, O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord... (Romans 7:24-25) If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed. (John 8:36) For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich. (2 Corinthians 8:9)

May we continue to pray and praise God that He gives us more grace to believe our many sins forgiven in the name and precious blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and for ever. (2 Peter 3:18) The living church of Christ on this earth has always been looked upon as weak and beggarly. The children of God are looked upon as insignificant by the religious world's standards.

The devil, with his agents, may whisper: "Psst! Follow me. I know of an easier way." The ever-abiding Spirit of God within us will soar to life telling the devil

The Apostles' Creed: Part 1

he Creed is divided into three parts, treating respectively of the three persons of the Holy Trinity: the first, of the Father; the second, of the Son; the third, of the Holy Spirit. The Creed contains the most important articles of faith. All other articles of belief depend upon them.

Observe that there are two ways of believing. In the first place, I may have a faith concerning God. This is the case when I hold to be true what is said concerning God. Such faith is on the same level with the assent I give to the statements concerning the Turk, the devil and hell. A faith of this kind should rather be called knowledge or information than faith.

In the second place, there is faith in God. Such faith is mine when I not only hold to be true what is said concerning God, but when I put my trust in Him in such a way as to enter into personal relations with Him, believing firmly that I shall find Him to be and to do as I have been taught. Not in the Turk do I believe thus, nor in any other man, however highly he may be praised. I may be readily induced to believe a man's piety, but that is no reason why I should build upon him. Such faith, which ventures everything upon what it has heard concerning God, be it life or death, constitutes the Christian man, and it receives everything of God it desires. Such a faith cannot tolerate a false and wicked heart; it is a living faith, such as the first commandment enjoins, which says, "I am thy God; thou shalt have no other gods." The word "in" is well chosen and deserving of due attention. We do not say, "I believe God the Father," or "concerning God the Father," but "in God the Father. In Jesus Christ. In the Holy Spirit." Such faith no one may claim but God alone, and it is a confession of the divinity of Christ and of the Holy Spirit that we believe in these as we believe in the Father. And inasmuch as the faith in one person of the Trinity is identical with that in the other two, it follows that the three persons are one God.

The First Article of the Creed

"I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth."

This means that I renounce the evil spirit, all idolatry, all witchcraft, all false faith. I place my confidence in no human being upon earth, nor even in myself, nor in my power, art, possessions, piety or anything I may have. I put my trust in no creature, be it in heaven or upon earth.

I venture to put my trust in the one God, who has created heaven and earth and is above all creatures, although absolutely beyond my sight and ken; further, I am not dismayed by all the wickedness of the devil and his associates, for my God is above them all. Though I should be forsaken and persecuted by all men, nevertheless, I shall believe in God. Although I may be

poor and humble, unlearned and despised, aye, bereft of everything, I shall believe none the less in God.

I believe, even though I am a sinner; for far above all things that are and are not—above all sin, virtue, all things—soars my faith, abiding in God pure and unsullied, as the first commandment enjoins upon me.

Nor will I tempt Him by asking a sign of Him. No matter how long He tarries, I will trust in Him. I will prescribe no bounds for Him as to purpose, time, measure and method; in sincere and upright faith I leave all things to His divine will.

Since He is almighty, what can I lack that He is unable to give or perform? Since He is the Creator of heaven and earth and Lord of all things, who will deprive me of anything or harm me? Indeed, how can all things fail to serve my welfare since I enjoy His favor, and all things are under His authority and control? Being God, He possesses both the power and wisdom to secure my highest welfare; being Father, He will surely do what is best, and delight in doing so.

Inasmuch as I doubt none of these things, and put my trust in Him, I am sure of being His child, servant and heir forever; and I shall receive even according to my faith. ~ ("The Creed: Part 2" coming next month!)

fulfilling the Father's will, suffering the penalty of sin in our stead and dying for us in order that we might have eternal life.



Unmistakable Religion

Then spake the Lord to Paul in the night by a vision, Be not afraid, but speak, and hold not thy peace: For I am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee: for I have much people in this city. And he continued there a year and six months, teaching the word of God among them. (Acts 18:9-11)

The work done in the apostolic days by the preaching of the Gospel was very decided. The religion which it produced was of no diluted nor ambiguous kind. The Christians of that era were men about whom there could be no mistake; uncompromising, unworldly, out-spoken men who were not ashamed of their faith, or of their Lord, or of His badge, the cross. They came out and were separate, and touched not the unclean thing. It was in this way that "the masses" of Corinth, and Ephesus, and other Gentile cities were "evangelized" and "elevated"; not by concerts, and clubs, and amusements either for eye or ear. Morality, culture, refinement were not despised; but the regeneration of individual men by the power of the Holy Ghost came first as the root of all blessing to the community. Temples of the Holy Ghost, not whited sepulchers, were what the primitive preachers sought to erect. Lights of the world, not lamps without oil, were what they sought to produce everywhere in the dark cities and villages of heathendom.

Nothing less than this is our work now; nothing below this must be the Church's standard in every age. Out and out Christianity, unmistakable religion, not varnished worldliness or baptized paganism. ... Ye must be born again (John 3:7); Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature... (2 Corinthians 5:17); And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God. (1 Corinthians 6:11): these are the keynotes of the church's testimony. Let us not lower this for a moment.

Religion in a soul or a church must be sick and ready to die when it requires the use of stimulants to restore it, the stimulants of music, and dresses, and postures, and ceremonies; or the stimulants of speculation and mysticism, and the enticing words of man's wisdom (1 Corinthians 2:4). Rather, may we say, that it *is* dead; and these are the [methods used] to make a dead man look, and stare, and roll his eyes like a living one. ~

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The Life Story of John Raattama

Juhani Raattamaa (1811—1899) was a significant spiritual leader in the Laestadian revival movement after the death of L.L. Laestadius in 1861. Earlier, Raattamaa had closely studied Scripture and Luther's writings concerning the proclamation of the forgiveness of sins to the penitent sinner. Laestadius engaged in a similar study after speaking with Raattamaa. The proclamation of forgiveness in Jesus' name and blood brought tremendous spiritual comfort and joy to many who had been unable to find personal assurance previously. As a leader, Raattamaa believed that congregational unity will be maintained if the church is governed by following Christ's teachings and ordinances and that the Church should be led and governed by leaders who follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit and not through human lordship over the flock. he father of John Raattama had tried always to live a Christian life, but when he realized that he could not fulfill the holy Law of God, he concluded in his mind that only children could attain heaven. Dark and hopeless indeed must have been his footsteps toward eternity, as he had no other covering for his spiritual nakedness than his own filthy rags of self-righteousness. But before he died, living faith came to his homeland. His son, John Raattama, Jr., received the Spirit of God and was able by faith to see the thorn-crowned King and Savior of mankind. "I received strength that I did not possess before," he relates.

"I was truly able to believe all my sins forgiven in His name and holy blood, and the peace that I had sought for afar off, I found nearby. Oh, how ashamed I was of my unbelief of the past! But though I now was enjoying peace and joy in the Holy Ghost, and carrying on my work as a Sunday School teacher, I felt sin so greatly in my flesh that I began to fear and, because of that, fasted and prayed, thinking, 'Doesn't a true Christian become better?' I didn't understand that that which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is Spirit, and by the Spirit we overcome the deeds of the flesh, for Jesus Christ is our mediator before God. He who is truly righteous is looking in Spirit upon the cross where Jesus is nailed, and he receives strength to overcome the flesh and to avoid the worst of sins, but still evil thoughts and lusts often wounded my conscience," says Raattama. "I have been often unable to deny myself and free myself of pressing doubts. For this reason I have often had to hear the assurance from my brothers and sisters in the Lord that my sins are forgiven in Jesus' name and blood." "A weak traveler I have been," he often said.

Once he spoke from Romans 8 as follows: "The boundary line of the kingdom of grace is this, that ye

through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body. Feeling our fleshly lusts does not bring us into perdition, for the blood of Jesus Christ cleanses us and He is our mediator." Those of us who heard the sermon felt at that time the peace of our Lord abundantly.

There was a certain young Christian woman who was always asking to have her sins testified forgiven. Raattama advised her thus: "The grace is not ours when we hear our sins pronounced forgiven and hear the assurance with our ears, but without ceasing the grace flows to us from heaven through the blood of Jesus and the Holy Spirit through faith in spiritual prayer."

When Raattama was asked if people are saved in other religions than this one, he answered, "As God is immeasurable, so are His works. Christ is the Door, and His Holy Spirit the Doorkeeper. From this we know that he who has been born with pain will come into the Sheepfold; that is, he will come into unity of love with the Christians although he may have received faith somewhere else than in our midst." This was his clear reply to this important question.

When he was asked if people come into the living faith by reading the Word of God, his reply was, "If such be the case, he will also need to hear it. It is not right if a Christian does not wish for any other friends besides the Bible. Faith unites us unto God; love unites us unto our neighbor."

Raattama also spoke of godly fear thus: "The fear that comes from the Law keeps one in a fearful, hopeless state. It does not give us strength nor has it a desire to mortify the body; but believing the Gospel with a childlike faith is the right kind of godly fear, instilling within us a love toward the Law of God, i.e, in the words which are written in the Bible and an inner longing to do the will of the dear heavenly Father. That is the fruit of living faith, which is of the same nature as Christ's love, as it teaches us to put away all ungodly ways, to live a righteous and godly life in this world, and to await the blessed hope of the coming of our Lord and Savior."

Confession of sin Raattama does not demand, but he says, "Let each confess only those sins that torment his conscience, and ask for the gift of faith that you may

receive a peaceful conscience. Right every wrong that you have done and you will receive peace and rest for your soul. Even then a peaceful conscience is a gift from God, received only by grace, through faith in Jesus our Lord." ~

That any of us should be willing to seek after the lost is nothing wonderful—they are of our own race; but that He, the offended God, against whom the transgression has been committed, should take upon Himself the form of a servant, and bear the sin of many, and should then be willing to receive the vilest of the vile, this is marvelous.

"This Man receiveth sinners"—not, however, that they may remain sinners, but He receives them that He may pardon their sins, justify their persons, cleanse their hearts by His purifying Word, preserve their souls by the indwelling of the Holy Ghost, and enable them to serve Him, to show forth His praise, and to have communion with Him. Into His heart's love He receives sinners, takes them from the dunghill, and wears them as jewels in His crown; plucks them as brands from the burning, and preserves them as costly monuments of His mercy. None are so precious in Jesus' sight as the sinners for whom He died. When Jesus receives sinners, He has not some out-of-doors reception place, no casual ward where He charitably entertains them as men do passing beggars, but He opens the golden gates of His royal heart, and receives the sinner right into Himself—yea, He admits the humble penitent into personal union and makes Him a member of His body, of His flesh, and of His bones. There was never such a reception as this! This fact is still most sure today: He is still receiving sinners; would to God sinners would receive Him.

The Storm Is Ours!

Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ...Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us.

Romans 8:35, 37

Shall "tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword" separate us from the love of Christ? The very contrary: they unite us more closely to Him. We not merely survive, but are victorious. *Nay, in*

all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. More than conquerors—not merely remaining in possession of the field, but coming forth unscathed from the conflict, and not merely unscathed, but invigorated. He is indeed a conqueror who, resolutely resisting an attack, wards off every blow so that he suffers no injury, and who, though the conflict may be stern, overthrows, disarms, and tramples under foot his assailant. But if with a generous hand he raises him from the ground and, not content with overcoming his body by superior valor, subdues his spirit also, by superior love, he gains a victory yet more complete. By mastering the foe, he becomes a conqueror; but by converting that foe into a friend, he becomes "more than conqueror."

Such is the victory of the believer. The trials by which he is assailed are not only deprived of all power to injure, but become the principal occasions and instruments of his invigoration, comfort, and salvation. However forbidding their appearance, however rough their salutation, they are bearers of heaven's most precious blessings. They wear the aspect of foes only at a distance, and in the beginning of the fight. Soon the Christian warrior embraces them as friends; and the weapons that seemed pointed against him are by faith reversed, and become ranged around him for his defense. His assailants are now his allies; and thus recruited by the encounter, "in all these things he is more than conqueror, through Him that loved us."

Faith, which recognizes in all events the voice of Jesus, is the true alchemy that transmutes all baser substances into gold! However otherwise valueless, even though pernicious and destructive, they now become a precious treasure. In the calculation of his wealth, the believer may include his heaviest trials and keenest sorrows! Apostle Paul says, For all things are yours... the world, or life, or death, or things present, or things to come; all are yours; And ye are Christ's; and Christ is God's. (1 Corinthians 3:21-23) Men do not reckon losses among their possessions. These "all things" are therefore gain to those of whom it may be added "and you are Christ's." Afflictions therefore, the frowns of "the world" as well as its smiles; the sorrows of "life" as well as its joys; the sad separations and painful approaches of "death," as well as the heavenly summons it conveys; the storms and struggles of "things present," as well as the calm and the repose of "things to come"—ALL are ours. Were we wise, we would not wish to part with one of them, for who deliberately impoverishes himself? If we see as God sees, we would understand how they were all working together for our good. But though we walk by faith, not by sight, we may be certain of the result, since God declares it. **The storm is ours!**
