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Our Blessed Heritage

The History of the Apostolic Lutheran Church of Lake Worth, Florida

ince World War II, the Lake Worth/Lantana Florida area has become home to a substantial Finnish community. Even as late as the 2000 census, Lake Worth boasted the biggest Finnish population in Florida and is reported to be among the largest in the United States. Many, if not most, of these people were "snowbirds" who would come down for the winter months and return to their northern homes during the warmer times of the year. The Finnish Apostolic Lutheran church people began holding homechurch services in the area during the 1950s. One of the earliest couples, Eric and Hilja Rosengren, originally from Massachusetts, lived in a house about a block from the Intracoastal waterway in Lake Worth. They had previously lived in Miami. Eric had an interesting audio recorder that recorded onto spools of thin steel wire instead of tape.

By the mid-1960s, several families from our background had moved to the area and the church moved from meeting in homes to a rented church in Lantana. This was followed by meeting on the upper floor of the Lake Worth City Hall before building our

own church on "B" Street in 1968. Some of the first families were Paul and Sylvia Krook in 1964, Walter and Alvilde Inget in 1965, Roy and Verna Davidson in 1966, and Wally and Betty Somero in 1968. The 1968 church construction project was run by Emil Tikkanen and the labor was provided by church members. Andrew Mickelsen, who had already retired his 40-year pastorate in Hancock,

Michigan, was a winter resident and officiated at the dedication. Roy Davidson served as pastor for many years, followed by our current pastor, Ansten Tretten. A new church

building in Western Lake Worth was completed in September 1991, again built by our congregation members.

In the 1960s and 1970s, the Finnish community was perhaps the dominant ethnic group in Lake Worth and Lantana. Along Federal Highway there were a number of hotels with Finnish owners and a good sauna was pretty easy to find. There was a Finnish radio program, and it was fairly common to hear Finnish spoken on the streets of Lake Worth. As recently as the early 2000s there were two Finnish bakeries still in the area.

Lake Worth and Lantana are still home to two Finnish heritage halls/clubs, as well as various Finnish churches, including our Apostolic Lutheran Church, St. Andrews Evangelical Lutheran Church, First Apostolic Lutheran Church, Old Apostolic Lutheran Church and even a Finnish Pentecostal church. We still hold a weekly church service at the Finnish-American Rest Home in Lantana.

Here in Palm Beach County, we now have a population of over a million people from all over the globe. his is a tribute to a dear sister, Mrs. Helen (Edwin) Marie Tapio Juntunen, of Chassell, Michigan, December 17, 1925-July 17, 2012, wife and mother of six children, and step mother of Jane Liupakka and Judy Somero.

I will never forget, as a teenager sitting in the back seat of a '36 Ford on a hot summer Sunday afternoon in Chassell, when Helen walked up and through the open window asked me, "How is it with your soul?" Even though I had no idea what a soul was, it struck me as something important. Right then I wished the seat would open up and swallow me or that I was someplace else. I did not want to face the question. I had no answer.

Some time before I had heard Rev. Andrew Mickelsen speak on the last days from the Revelation and how the Christians would suffer. That had shocked me. I had never heard anything like that.

There were Christians in those days who would confront you about your salvation. I don't see or hear that today. Yes, I know a sermon is an appeal to be saved or have faith in the Lord. But I don't see the personal

concern over souls. Helen's question led to my personal conversion, my life changed, over fifty years in the ministry, and a lifetime study of what the soul is. The Old Preacher said, "The soul is the undying portion of a person."

The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life; and he that winneth souls is wise. (Proverbs 11:30)

There are various approaches to personal salvation, but I like the Roman way. When you enter a serious talk with a person about spiritual matters and their relationship with the Lord, and they have not been saved, ask them to open the Bible to the following verses:

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"He That Is Without Sin..."

And the scribes and Pharisees brought unto him a woman taken in adultery; and when

they had set her in the midst, They say unto him, Master, this woman was taken in adultery, in the very act. Now Moses in the law commanded us, that such should be stoned: but what sayest thou? This they said, tempting him, that they might have to accuse him. But Jesus stooped down, and with his finger wrote on the ground, as though he heard them not. So when they continued asking him, he lifted up himself, and said unto them, He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her. And again he stooped down, and wrote on the ground. And they which heard it, being convicted by their own conscience, went out one by one, beginning at the eldest, even unto the last: and Jesus was left alone, and the woman standing in the midst. When Jesus had lifted up himself, and saw none but the woman, he said unto her, Woman, where are those thine accusers? hath no man condemned thee? She said, No man, Lord. And Jesus said unto her, Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more.

ach of us, in an instant, can think of humanity at its worst. The atrocities and genocide in many countries ■ of the world can quickly come to our mind. Other thoughts are also not too far off, like public bombings, taking advantage of natural disasters, and the greed and corruption that we read so much about. These are visions that challenge the widespread hope that people are generally good, leaving in its wake the sick feeling of human depravity. Perhaps unconsciously we place ourselves in a different category—we consider their inferior nature, their primitive sense of morality, or their depraved nature. It is rare that we see the stones in our hands, as in the story of the woman taken in adultery: Now Moses in the law commanded us, that such should be stoned: but what sayest thou? Jesus replied, He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her. (John 8:5, 7)

In this story, Jesus stood with this woman while a group armed with rocks was ready to stone her to death, in accordance with the Law of Moses. As Jesus stood there, He crouched down in the sand and wrote something. We don't know what He wrote that day with the Pharisees, yet we often emerge from the story not with curiosity, but with satisfaction. The conviction of the Pharisees strikes with the force of

victory. Their air of superiority is very noticeable, and it is satisfying to picture them eventually owning up to their own sins. If we imagine ourselves in the scene at all, it is most likely in a crumpled heap of shame with the woman at Jesus' feet; it is rarely, if ever, felt by the Pharisee.

But are we not like the group of men, with their pharisaical nature? Most of us recognize in ourselves the potential for something other than good, for greed or for cruelty, for vice just as easily as for virtue. Even those who disapprove of the word "sin" have seen it in expressions in their lives and in others. Looking below the surface of our good days or friendly moments, it is hard not to admit who we really are at the heart of things—on good days or even average days—when we are tempted. It is not a giant leap to see ourselves in the adulterous woman.

It is far more difficult, however, to consider how well we play the role of the Pharisee. But like the Pharisees. Christians who have come to recognize the dark realities of sin before the light of God are troubled at sin's bleak pervasiveness. Hence, sometimes standing with stones, other times simply putting ourselves in lesser categories of depravity, we can look at the crumpled sinful world around us with an air of disgust. In fact, no matter one's profession of belief or practice of faith, we can rally together in circles of righteousness, surrounding those whose lack of virtue is far more obvious. We can name their sins publicly and consider their humiliation well-deserved, perhaps even beneficial. All the while, we fail to see our pharisaical similarities. Jesus crouches beside us writing something in the sand that fails to catch our attention.

In the worst images of humanity, we cannot afford to leave ourselves out. For in them is a picture of how far the curse extends within, and how great is the reach of God's cure. Considering the depths of human depravity without seeing ourselves in the picture is failing to see the true depths. Viewing the sins of the world with a position of superiority is like picking up the stones God has saved you from and hurling them at someone else. Jesus has called us to examine both the stones in our hands and our rocky hearts, and to drop every one at His feet.

After the Pharisees had released the rocks they held and walked away one by one, Jesus asked the woman beside Him: Woman, where are those thine accusers? hath no man condemned thee? She said, No man, Lord. And Jesus said unto her, Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more. ~

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

Such was the triumphant exultation of the Old Testament Church! Their noblest hopes were founded upon the promise of MESSIAH; their most sublime songs were derived from the prospect of His Advent. By faith, which is the substance of things hoped for, they considered the gracious declarations of the faithful unchangeable God as already accomplished, though the actual performance respected a period, as yet, future and distant. Believers under that dispensation already felt the influence of the redemption which MESSIAH was to consummate in the fullness of time. It was the knowledge of His engagement on the behalf of sinners that gave life and significance to all the institutions of the ceremonial law which otherwise, though of divine appointment, would have been a heavy and burdensome yoke (Acts 15:10). Isaiah therefore prepares his joyful song for the true servants of God who lived in his time; and though it was a day of trial and rebuke, they were provided with sufficient compensation for all their sufferings, being warranted to say, Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon His shoulder...

This ancient song is still new. It has been, and will be, taken up from age to age by the New Testament Church, with superior advantage. I trust many of you

understand it well, and rejoice in it daily. Men naturally look for something wherein to rejoice and glory. Little reason have the wise to glory in their supposed wisdom, or the strong in their fading strength, or the rich in their transitory wealth (Jeremiah 9:23); but this is a just and unfailing ground of glory to true Christians, that,

Unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given...
