# Goliath

1 Samuel 17

oliath of Gath, the champion of the Philistine army, was a giant of a man. He wore heavy armor for protection and carried mighty weapons. He stood before the ranks of Israel's army and taunted them. Goliath wanted to fight and he shouted a challenge to Israel: "Send a man to fight me, a fight to the death. The loser's army will become the slaves of the winner's army!"

The army of Israel was afraid of Goliath. He was a big, strong man, and no one wanted to fight him. Every morning and every evening for forty days, Goliath came out and made his challenge and the army of Israel became more and more frightened.

avid, a young shepherd boy, went to the battle front to deliver food to his brothers and to get news of the battle for his father. While David was there, Goliath came out and roared his challenge once again. David saw the men of Israel were afraid of Goliath. They were saying, "The man who kills Goliath will be greatly rewarded by King Saul and will marry the princess."

David said, "Who is this uncircumcised Philistine who defies the armies of the living God?"

When King Saul heard that David was asking about Goliath and the reward, he sent for David. David said to the king, "Nobody should be afraid of this Philistine. I'll go and fight with him!"

King Saul replied, "You can't go and fight him; you're just a boy! He's been a warrior since he was young."

David explained that, while he was watching his father's sheep, he'd killed a lion and a bear, and that Goliath would die, too, because he'd defied the armies of the living God. He said, "The LORD who delivered me from the paw of the lion and the bear will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine."

King Saul said, "Go, and the LORD go with you." He gave his own armor and sword to David, but David gave them back because he hadn't tested them.

David took his shepherd's staff and five smooth stones from the brook. He put the stones in his shepherd's bag. He took his sling in his hand and went toward Goliath.

When Goliath saw David was just a young boy, he disdained and mocked him: "Am I a dog, since you're coming at me with sticks?" He cursed David by his false gods and said, "Come here, boy! I'll feed your flesh to the birds and the beasts!"

David replied, "You come to me with your weapons, but I come to you in the name of the LORD of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied. Today the LORD will deliver you into my hand, and I will cut off your head and feed the flesh of your armies to the birds and the beasts, so that all the earth will know that there is a God in Israel. They will know the LORD does not save with sword and spear, for the battle is the LORD's and He will deliver you into our hands."



Goliath charged at David, and David quickly went to meet him. He put his hand into his shepherd's bag and drew out a smooth stone. He slipped it into his sling and whirled it around and sent the stone flying through the air toward the giant. The stone hit Goliath on his forehead and he fell on his face on the ground, killed by the stone that David had slung. David had no sword, but he ran and drew Goliath's sword and cut off his head.

When the Philistine army saw that their champion was dead, they ran away. The armies of Israel, no longer afraid, chased them and won the battle.

The battle was the LORD's and He delivered Goliath into David's hand. The living God saved little David from the giant and gave Israel, His chosen people, the victory.



Pray with your baby and for your baby. The best way to teach the value of prayer is by example. Let your baby see you praying, both asking God for your needs and thanking Him for providing for them. Teach them that they can talk to God anytime, anywhere.

Here is a little fingerplay to teach your toddler about prayer and going to church.

"Here is the church." (Fold hands with fingers tucked inside.)

"Here is the steeple." (Bring index fingers up into a steeple on the "church.")

"Open the door and see all the people."
(Open hands to show the finger "people.")

"Close the door and let them pray." (Fold hands in prayer.)

"Open the door; they've all gone away."
(Open hands to show that the "people" are no longer there.)



After the flood, when Noah and his family had come out of the ark, God made a covenant with Noah and all his descendants, and the

animals and birds and every living creature. God promised never to destroy the earth by a flood again. God set His rainbow in the sky as a sign to all future generations of His promise. When we look at a rainbow, we remember God's promise.

When God looks at the rainbow, He also remembers His promise. He told Noah, "When I see the rainbow in the clouds, I will remember My covenant with you and with every living creature never to destroy the earth by a flood again."

Isn't it interesting that we use the rainbow to remember God's promise, and that God also uses the rainbow to remember His promise? The rainbow is a reminder for us and for God—of His covenant which will last forever.



If you could look at a rainbow from very, very high in the sky, it would look like a full circle. We can only see a part of the rainbow, so we can only see a part of the circle. But God can see the WHOLE circle, a giant round rainbow reminder of His promise which will never fail!



David was a young boy when he faced the giant. Goliath laughed at him and teased him for coming to the battle with a stick, but God gave David the victory.

Miriam was a young girl when she saved her brother Moses' life. (Exodus 2)

Joash was seven years old when he was anointed king of Judah. (2 Kings 11)

#### Do you ever think that you aren't big enough to do important things in God's kingdom?

Although you are young, you are an important part of God's kingdom. Children have done many life-changing things when they have trusted and served the Lord. You may not be a king, or save someone's life, or slay a giant, but you do important things every day. You share the love of Jesus with the world around you: in your family, in your school, in your church, with your friends. You show others the good things that God has done for you. The light of Jesus shines in the world around you.

Even when you help Mom with your baby sister or brother, or when you help Dad wash the car, you're doing important things. The Bible says, "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus (Colossians 3:17, paraphrase)." Everything we do, even chores or schoolwork, is to be done in the name of Jesus. He loves that we bring glory to His name by the things that we do. He is pleased with our words and our deeds when we do them in His name.





Do you have a "Goliath" in your life? Something that is so much bigger than you are that you can never overcome it on your own? A problem or fear that overwhelms you?

For each person, the giant you face is as individual as you are. Some people face more than one giant.

# You are not alone in your battle against the giant!

Like David, you have the power of the living God on your side. The God who defeated Goliath is just as powerful today as He was in David's day.

When King Saul tried to give David his armor to use, David returned it to him because he hadn't tested it. Like David, you can give back the untested armor of this world and put your trust completely in the Almighty God, the LORD of hosts who never fails. Don't put your trust in the things of this earth; if you are relying on earthly things, they will fail.

But the LIVING GOD will never fail you.

God gives victory over giant problems and fears. He hears from heaven and delivers from overwhelming circumstances.

Now know I that the LORD saveth his anointed; he will hear him from his holy heaven with the saving strength of his right hand.

Some trust in chariots, and some in horses: but we will remember the name of the LORD our God. They are brought down and fallen: but we are risen, and stand upright.

# Teens

Ahhh, the language and lingo common to text messages. Typing the letter u instead of the word "you" or the number 2 instead of the word "to" are examples. Many different words can be shortened this way, and

it's efficient. You can say more in a shorter message.

Everything in text language isn't good, though. A common phrase used in messages is "omg" and it means "Oh my God." Both Christians and non-Christians might use this text phrase, maybe not understanding what it really means.

God states in the Bible that His name is holy and it is to be held in high esteem.

# Neither shall ye profane my holy name; but I will be hallowed among the children of Israel.

Leviticus 22:32

To "profane" means to misuse something that should be held in reverence, to make common something that is holy. It means to treat a holy thing without respect.

The second commandment states: "Thou shalt not take the name of the LORD thy God in vain..." Using the phrase "Oh my God! This shirt is so cute," or "Did you see what that guy did? Oh my God!" is disrespecting God's holy name. It's making a slang term out of a name that should be held in the very highest esteem.

God's name is holy. His desire is that His children would use His name in a way that is pleasing to Him and that honors Him, rather than in a way that makes His name common or disrespected. When others see that you honor God's name, they will know that you respect the LORD and He will be glorified through your reverence.

When you speak or write the name of the LORD, let people know that you are referring to your Father, whom you hold in high regard. Whether speaking aloud with your mouth or messaging silently through your fingertips, may this verse always be your prayer:

Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O LORD, my strength, and my redeemer.

And so if God has placed you As a soldier in the field,


Just obey all His commands And to Him humbly yield.


How many Spears are on this page?



## For Parents:

The giant is slain by a young shepherd boy: it sounds like a fantastic fairy tale. Help your child to understand that the Bible stories he hears are not simply "stories" but true accounts of people from long ago. Teach your child the true and real and powerful Word of the living God.

David was only a youth when he faced Goliath. When your child faces a "Goliath" in his life, point him to the living God who delivered David from the hand of the giant. Only by trusting in the LORD for deliverance can your child find shelter from the stresses of growing up in an increasingly ungodly world. Share your own experience of rescue from a "giant" with your child. Let him see you trusting God for deliverance from situations that are insurmountable by your own strength.

He has given you victory through the shed blood of His dear Son, Jesus Christ. He has brought forgiveness of sin, life and salvation to you through His atoning death and glorious resurrection.
