LONG, LONG AGO, IN THE LAND OF UZ, lived a man named Job. He was a righteous man who feared God and turned away from evil. Job was very rich, and he had 7,000 sheep, 3,000 camels, 500 pairs of oxen, 500 female donkeys, and many servants. He was the greatest man in the east.

Job had 10 children: 7 sons and 3 daughters. They often had feasts together. Job worried about his children, often wondering if they had sinned and cursed God in their hearts. Job always offered sacrifices to God for his children.

**O**NE DAY, THE LORD SAID TO SATAN, "Have you noticed my servant Job, how there is no one like him on earth, a blameless, upright man who fears God and turns from evil?"


Satan replied, "Skin for skin! A man will give anything he has for his life! If you touch his bones and flesh, he will curse You to Your face!"

The Lord answered, "Look! Job is in your hand, only you must spare his life!"



## Jots & Tittles and Tittles & Jots

Jesus said, "I did not come to destroy the Law, but to fulfill it. Not one jot or tittle will pass from the Law until all is fulfilled."

jot (rhymes with hot): a teeny-tiny letter called *yod* in the Hebrew alphabet tittle (rhymes with little): a teeny-tiny part of a letter in the Hebrew alphabet

Jesus meant that we are not ever to change God's Law, not even a little bit. Our perfect holy God gave His perfect holy Law, and He meant what He said, even the teeny-tiniest part of the teeny-tiniest commandment. He does not want us to break His Law. In fact, the punishment for breaking God's holy Law is death.

English may be a funny language, but that isn't funny at all. We can't keep God's holy Law, because we fall into sin every day. We may not break God's holy Law by doing sinful things like stealing or killing, but we are fallen sinful humans, and we *think* sinful thoughts and we *say* sinful things and we *don't do* the good things that we should do.

Thanks be to God, Jesus did not come to destroy or change the Law, but He came to fulfill the Law for us. Jesus did what we could not do. He lived a perfect sinless life, and then He gave Himself to die on the cross in our place. When we believe and trust in Jesus, His perfection is given to us, and we are counted as sinless in God's sight. We are seen as having kept God's holy perfect Law ourselves, even though we are sinners who break the holy Law of God in thought, word and deed.



God Almighty—who makes the wind blow—spoke to Job out of a whirlwind. Do you think Job was afraid? It would be a frightening experience to hear the wind speak with the voice of the Lord!

Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind... Job 38:1

## God's Spirit Is Like the Wind

Can we see the wind? No! We can observe the *effects* of the wind: we can *see* the leaves and tree branches moving, we can *feel* the movement of the air, we can *hear* the whistling sound that the wind makes, but we can't see the wind itself.

Who has seen the wind? Neither I nor you. But when the leaves hang trembling, The wind is passing through. Who has seen the wind? Neither you nor I. But when the trees bow down their heads, The wind is passing by. Christina Rossetti

Jesus said, "The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear the sound of it, but you can't tell where it comes from or where it is going. It is this way with every one who is born of the Spirit."

God's Holy Spirit is always moving like the wind, working in our hearts to show us the things of Jesus. The Spirit calls us by the preaching of the Gospel. The Spirit teaches us about Jesus and His death on the cross for us. The Spirit sanctifies us (makes us holy in the Father's sight) and keeps us in faith day after day. The Spirit comforts us with the peace that comes from knowing that our sins are forgiven.

The Holy Spirit lives within every one who believes in Jesus. Thank God for sending His Spirit—the Comforter—to us! Job knows the Lord is wise and strong, and that no one can stand against Him. Because of this, he wishes he could appeal to God for mercy, for it seems to Job that sometimes God destroys the



innocent along with the guilty. Job complains that the Lord is inaccessible. There is no way to reason with Him because God is not a man like Job is. He laments that there isn't a "daysman" between them, an arbiter or mediator with the authority to settle the case between him and God.

## Jesus Is Our Daysman

We are in much the same situation as Job. We know that God is wise and strong, and always RIGHT. No one can stand against Him. We want to appeal to God for mercy, because we know we are guilty of breaking God's Law. We need peace with God, to know that He will not punish us for our sins, to know that we are not separated from Him eternally. We need a Daysman who has the authority to settle the sincase between us and God.

Praise God! We have a Daysman, a Mediator, a Peace-Maker! Paul wrote to Timothy: "There is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all, to be testified at the proper time."

The God-Who-Became-Man Jesus stands in the court of judgment on our side. He has settled the case Himself, paying our debt with His own blood. He stands before the Father and says, "This child's sin debt is mine. See the perfect white robe that I have placed on Your child. I have paid the debt. This child is not guilty."

And the verdict will ring out as the gavel falls: "NOT GUILTY!"



Our Mediator has ransomed us from the power of sin. Our Peace-Maker has made peace for us with God. Our Daysman has settled the sin-case in our favor.

How awesomely, amazingly cool is that?!

Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ: By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. AFTER ELIPHAZ, BILDAD AND ZOPHAR sat with Job in silence for seven days, they began to speak. The men had many long talks, wondering whether Job had sinned to cause all these calamities. They argued and argued about God, and said that the innocent don't suffer and that Job should repent of his wickedness and sins.



**EVENTUALLY JOB BECAME FRUSTRATED**, claiming that he was righteous before the Lord. He wanted to go before Almighty God and plead his case. He complained that there is no mediator between God and man, no peace-maker to help him. Job had some questions for God and he wanted answers.

When Job and his friends finally fell silent, young Elihu—a fourth friend who had listened to their discussion—spoke up. He had waited to speak out of respect for the older men, but now he had had enough. He was angry at Job for justifying himself instead of the Lord. He was angry at Job's friends because they had no good answer for Job, yet they condemned him.

Elihu said that the Lord was not Job's enemy, that God was not punishing him. The Almighty God did not have to answer to Job. God was always right and humans must be humble before Him. Elihu praised God's greatness and majesty. He told Job to stand still and consider the wondrous works of God.

THEN THE LORD SPOKE TO JOB out of a whirlwind. He said, "Who is speaking about things he doesn't understand? Get ready, because I have some questions for YOU!" Then God fired question after question at Job:

Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth? Tell Me, if you have understanding. Who laid out the measurements of the earth? What are its foundations fastened upon? Who laid its cornerstone, when the morning stars sang together and all the sons of God shouted for joy? Who set limits for the sea? Or said to it, "You will come this far and no farther! Here is where your proud waves will stop." Have you commanded the morning? Or caused the dawn? Have you entered the springs of the sea? Or walked in the depths? Have you understood the expanse of the earth? Tell it, if you know all this! Do you know where light dwells? And the place of darkness? Have you entered the storehouses of snow? Or seen the treasury of hail? Who made it rain upon the earth, to satisfy the dry land and cause the plants to grow? Can you cause the stars to move? Can you make it rain? Can you send forth lightning? Will you hunt prey for the lion? Who provides food for the ravens? Did you give the horse his strength? Does the hawk fly because of your wisdom? Shall the one who finds fault with the Almighty instruct Him? He who argues with God, let him answer!

Job answered the Lord: "Look! I am vile. What can I answer You? I will cover my mouth with my hand. I have spoken once, but I will not answer; twice, but I will go no further."

The Lord replied, "Get ready, because I have some more questions for you to answer."





Then the Lord said to Eliphaz: "I'm angry with you and your two friends because you have not spoken of Me what is right, as My servant Job has. Go offer a burnt offering for yourselves, and My servant Job will pray for you, that I will not deal with you according to your foolishness." And Eliphaz, Bildad and Zophar did as God had commanded.

THEN THE LORD RESTORED THE FORTUNES of Job. He gave Job twice as much as he had before. The LORD blessed Job's end more than his beginning: now he had 14,000 sheep, 6,000 camels, 1,000 pairs of oxen, 1,000 female donkeys, and 7 sons and 3 daughters. In all the land no women were as beautiful as Job's daughters, and their father gave them an inheritance among their brothers. Job lived many years and saw his great-great grandchildren. Then Job died, an old man and full of days.



## The Problem of Suffering

The book of Job can be a difficult story for children (and adults, sometimes!) to understand. There is so much suffering, so much pain, so much tragedy, and Job incurs loss after loss, seemingly to no good purpose. Job accuses the Lord of judging him falsely, of wronging him. He contends that God is to blame for his suffering. Though Job is often thought to endure suffering with patience, he doesn't hold the Almighty completely blameless for his trials. In their turns, Job's three friends accuse Job of some wrongdoing; they assume that Job is at fault for his suffering, that God is punishing him.

Finally Elihu asserts the sovereignty of God. Maybe Job's suffering is not punishment at all, neither brought on by God or by Job himself. Elihu says, "You say that you are innocent of wrongdoing, that God is treating you as His enemy. But you are wrong! God is greater than man. Why are you fighting against Him? The Almighty God doesn't have to give an account to you. He isn't wicked, and He doesn't pervert justice! He is mighty, strong and wise, and His works are to be magnified. Stand still, Job, and consider the wondrous works of God."

God's most wondrous work toward all mankind was His mercy in sending His only Son to redeem us from ourselves, to claim us as His own dear children. And this after we had turned away from Him and went our own way!

There is great suffering in our world, but it isn't God's fault. Just because He doesn't stop the tsunami or cure the cancer, He isn't to blame for the pain and the broken lives. All suffering is a result of sin, which entered the world at the fall of our first parents.

Through pain and suffering, look to the One who endured pain and suffering for you, who "purchased and won you from all sins, from death and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with His holy precious blood, and with His innocent suffering and death."

God is just. God is kind. God is merciful.
