# Do Not Be Anxious

Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself.

Matthew 6:34

AVING REBELLED against God by his first transgression, man slips from the realm of the limitless to the realm determined by a tyrannical limit: death. Our entire life is bounded by this limit, though the knowledge of it is almost always suppressed. It therefore forces upon us a certain measure of anxiety. This is our plague. We are anxious. Sometimes we do not know why; we cannot discern the source of our anxiety. But this we know—we are an anxious lot.

Jesus' teaching about anxiety is therefore most



astonishing, for it is incredibly simple: "Do not be anxious." *Take therefore no thought for the morrow...* A vexing thought, indeed! In one word Jesus distills the entire weight of the Old Testament Law and the expectation of God transmitted through every prophet who has ever walked this green earth. Do not be anxious?!! How is the world supposed to keep turning without a bit of anxiety? (It has been said that love

makes the world go 'round, but I think it could more truthfully be spoken about anxiety.) Jesus' teaching about anxiety is deliciously similar to His teaching about judgment: "Do not judge." Both teachings taken together illustrate for us the nature of Jesus' commands: They are simply impossible to fulfill. I am a worry-wart, and beyond that, I am an incurable judge. I am confirmed in these two states by the word of Christ Himself (see for reference Paul's discussion concerning the effect of the Law in Romans 7:7ff). I am not only a judge of others, mind you, but a judge of myself. Therefore, to find myself face to face with Jesus bidding me to deny anxiety and forego judgment leaves me with all the more anxiety and all the more propensity to judge; now to judge even Him! The weight is too much, the demand too stringent; I cannot survive...

Precisely the point... Jesus would later say: Whosoever shall fall on this stone shall be broken: but on whomsoever it shall fall, it will grind him to powder. (Matthew 21:44) It is not a pretty sight for the Old Adam when he comes into contact with the Living Lord. He must die or he must crucify him. He cannot have it both ways. We cannot survive an encounter with the real Christ; it provokes my old anxious and judgmental nature to its limit. He pushes me to the very boundary of existence and invites me to the other side. To venture to the other side—to go to God and lodge myself in the eternal One requires one thing: I must die. Not the "little death" of physical separation from spirit, but the "big death" of my ego, desires, self-will and pride.

But it is God's will that we should die, so we may be raised to an unlikely form of life. We, in Christ Jesus, live an "impossible" life, because we are freed from anxiety in Him who took our anxieties upon Himself at Calvary. He bore our burdens, it is written. Those burdens were not only the sins piled up through the ages until His coming nor only the ones from the generations since—they are the burdens of our sin, death and our incurable habits of worry and judgment. When Jesus bids us to live a life free from anxiety and judgment, He is really calling us back to Himself. He is calling us back to the unity with God that we shared before our epic Fall, back to His singular and perfect will, a will that none should perish but that all would share eternal life, a non-anxious life.

Through faith in Him we have already achieved what He demands. We have peace with God through faith in the Lord Jesus (Romans 5:1). Having believed, we are set free from the limit that provoked our anxiety. We are free from judgment, free from death. Jesus comes, therefore, not as an academic professor who counsels strict adherence to a code. Rather, He comes as One willing to die for our freedom from the code. He comes as One chosen to deliver us from the anxiety of the code. Therefore we do not worry. Not because we have decided not to worry, but because HE has shouldered the burden of our worry and HE alone has the power to set our hearts at rest. ~

## The Festival of Pentecost

HE FESTIVAL we call Pentecost had its origin as follows: When God was about to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt, He permitted them to celebrate the Feast of the Passover on the night of their departure; and commanded them on every annual recurrence of the season to observe the same feast in commemoration of their liberation from bondage and their departure from Egypt. Fifty days later, in their journey through the wilderness, they arrived at Mount Sinai. There God gave them the Law, through Moses;

and there they were commanded to observe annually, in commemoration of that giving of the Law, the fiftieth day after the Feast of the Passover. Hence the name "Feast of Pentecost," the word *Pentecost* coming from the Greek *Pentecoste*, or "fiftieth day." Our Saxons, rather more in conformity to the Greek, use the word *Pfingsten*. So we have it here of Luke: "When the day of Pentecost was now come," or "fully come"—when the Jews had properly commemorated the giving of the Law of God on Mount Sinai—the Holy Spirit came, in accordance with Christ's promise, and gave them a new law. We now celebrate this feast, not because of the old historical event, but because of the new one—the sending of the Holy Spirit. It is in order, then, to give a little instruction concerning the difference between our Pentecost and that of the Jews.

### Literal Law and Spiritual Law



The occasion of the Jews' observance was the giving of the literal Law; but it is ours to celebrate the giving of the spiritual law. To present the point more clearly, we cite Paul's distinction of the two covenants. Who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life. (2 Corinthians 3:6) And these two covenants respectively relate to two kinds of people.

First, there is the written Law commanded of God and composed of written words. It is styled "written" or "literal" because it goes no farther and does not enter the heart, nor are there any resulting works other than hypocritical and extorted ones. Consisting only of letters—a written Law—it is wholly dead. Its province being to kill, it ruled a dead people. With dead hearts men could not sincerely observe the commandments of God. Were every individual left to do as he pleased, being uninfluenced by fear, not one would be found choosing to be controlled by the Law.

Unquestionably, human nature is conscious of the fact that while it prefers to follow its own inclinations it is impelled to do otherwise; for it reasons: "If I observe not God's commandments, He will punish me, casting me into hell." Thus our nature is conscious of obeying unwillingly and contrary to desire. Because of the punishment that men fear, they soon become enemies to God; they feel themselves sinners, unable to stand before God, and consequently not acceptable to Him. Indeed, they would rather there were no God. Such enmity to God remains persistently in the heart, however beautifully nature may adorn itself outwardly. We see, therefore, how the Law, so long as it consists merely of written words, can make no one righteous, can enter no heart. Upon this topic we have elsewhere preached and written at length.

The other law is spiritual; not written with ink and pen, nor uttered by lips as Moses read from the tables of stone. We learn from the historical record of the event that the Holy Spirit descended from heaven and filled all the assembled multitude, and they appeared with parting, fiery tongues and preached so unlike they were wont to do that all men were filled with amazement. The Spirit came pouring into their hearts, making them different beings, making them creatures who loved and willingly obeyed God. This change was simply the manifestation of the Spirit Himself, His work in the heart. He wrote in those hearts His pure and fiery flame restoring them to life and causing them to respond with fiery tongues and efficient hands. They became new creatures, aware of possessing altogether different minds and different tendencies. Then all was life and light; understanding, will and heart burned and delighted in whatever was acceptable to God. Such is the true distinction between the written Law of God and the spiritual. Herein we perceive what is the work of the Holy Spirit.

### The Office of the Holy Spirit



Observe here, the Holy Spirit descends and fills the hearts of the disciples sitting in fear and sorrow. He renders their tongues fiery and cloven, and inflames them with love unto boldness in preaching Christ—unto free and fearless utterance. Plainly, then, it is not the office of the Spirit to write books or to institute laws. He writes in the hearts of men, creating a new heart, so that man may rejoice before God, filled with love for Him and ready, in consequence, to serve His fellows gladly.

What are the means and process the Spirit employs to change and renew the heart? It is through preaching Jesus Christ the Lord, as Christ Himself says (John 15:26): "When the Comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father, even the Spirit of truth, which proceedeth from the Father, He shall bear witness of Me." As we have often heard, the Gospel is the message God would have preached world-wide, declaring to every individual that since no man can through the Law be made righteous, but must rather become more unrighteous, God sent His own beloved Son to shed His blood and die for our sins, from which sins we could not be released by our own effort.

It is not enough simply that Christ be preached; the Word must be believed. Therefore, God sends the Holy Spirit to impress the preaching upon the heart—to make it inhere and live therein. Unquestionably, Christ accomplished all—took away our sins and overcame every obstacle, enabling us to become, through Him, lords over all things. But the treasure lies in a heap; it is not everywhere distributed and applied. Before we can enjoy it, the Holy Spirit comes and communicates it to the heart, enabling us to believe and say, "I, too, am one who shall have the blessing." To everyone who hears is grace offered through the Gospel; to grace is he called, as Christ says (Matthew 11:28), "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden," etc.

Now, with the belief that God has come to our rescue and given us this priceless blessing, inevitably the human heart must be filled with joy and with gratitude to God, and must exultingly cry: "Dear Father, since it is Thy will to manifest toward me inexpressible love and fidelity, I will love Thee sincerely, and willingly do what is pleasing to Thee."

The believing heart never sees God with jealous eye. It does not fear being cast into hell as it did before the Holy Spirit came, when it was conscious of no love, no goodness, no faithfulness, on God's part, but only wrath and displeasure. But once let the Holy Spirit impress the heart with the fact of God's good will and graciousness towards it, and the resulting joy and confidence will impel it to do and suffer for God's sake whatever necessity demands.

Let us learn to recognize the Holy Spirit—to know that His mission is to present to us the priceless Christ and all His blessings; to reveal them to us through the Gospel and apply them to the heart, making them ours. ~

Children, put your trust in God and keep on believing in His Son Jesus. He will NOT disappoint you or ever leave you, as you can read in the verses below.



# Training a Child

NNUALLY, IN JUNE, WE AS a nation celebrate Father's Day and in our congregation we conduct the rite of confirmation for our youth. Both of these traditions are significant blessings which we share with one another in families and in the fellowship of the Church. Both are an important part of bringing up children in the training and admonition of the Lord.



As fathers, we have a tremendous responsibility to the children that the Lord has given us. We not only have the duty of providing for their physical needs such as food and clothing, but more so the guidance and instruction that is vital that they may live godly lives and serve both God and

their fellow man. It is said, "A lesson is not really taught until it is learned!" This requires a continual process of teaching and re-teaching the Word of the Lord, values, character, discipline, responsibility and a host of other things. You got up early to help me with my homework and I appreciated that!" When this kind of thing happens, everyone feels good about it, and it binds hearts and lives together. My response was, "It doesn't get any better than that!" And it truly doesn't. For this is what this article is all about: our relationships with one another and with God in the fellowship of His people.

When the Church undertakes the responsibility to train up the young in the way of the Lord, a foundation of knowledge is laid. Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path. (Psalm 119:105) The purpose is to teach children the way of salvation, and also to set the wisdom of God's truth before them as a guide for their lives.

Our confirmation camp program provides the opportunity for our confirmands to hear the word of instruction from several pastors, and get acquainted with them in an informal setting, along with developing friendships with other young people. All of these have proven effective in equipping the saints, preparing them for their witness in life as ones who worship and faithfully serve the Lord. ~

# Time After Pentecost—The Church Age

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AVE WE STOPPED TO CONSIDER the Church calendar? Right now we are in the season referred to as the Time after Pentecost. Every season in the Church calendar reflects a given time that we find in the Scripture. The Time after Pentecost spoken of in the Scripture is the very same time period we now live. With news of war and rumors of war, we

often find ourselves given over to thoughts that our current age is far from godly. Yet, the age in which we live is the very same age in which the apostles lived. It is the Church Age.

What does it mean to live in the Church Age? It means that we actually have positions of power on earth, that—as Christians—we have something that can overturn the world. In Acts 17:6, the believers are referred to as "these that have turned the world upside down." Then why do we act as those who are powerless in the world? Jesus Himself tells us in John 14:12: Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto my Father. He's not saying that we are going to do a mightier act than He did, but that we will do more. Jesus was going to His Father, but we are here. We are left here not as orphans, as Jesus goes on to say, but He will come to us. When He comes, He will give us the Holy Spirit, which brings us to Pentecost, and our current age, the Time after Pentecost.

We should be encouraged that we do not live in a godless age, but we live in a time when God dwells in us. We do not pray to a God who is far off, but one at hand, who has given us to do "greater works than these." As we encounter the very apparent ravages of the fall of man, remember that we have the restoration within us. That is what empowers us in this age, that we may take a lesson from the namesake of our federation, the apostles, and go into the world boldly, truly believing that God is the one in power. This means we will find ourselves even in positions of peril, but never bound for destruction, because we are that new creation. We are raised with Jesus, and His resurrection is forever. Just as Jesus will never die again, neither will we. This is the Time after Pentecost, the Church Age. ~

### He Was Made Sin for Us

For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him.

2 Corinthians 5:21


H, WHAT A MIGHTY WORD! The word here is not sin offering, but sin, "made to be sin". And this means that He was so covered with the sins of all the world that He could be called sheer sin.

As Bishop Herselb says of this text:

He was made to be *sin itself* so that God did not consider Him anything else than sheer sin. So as to say, God made Him to be a block of sin, a lump of sin... in order that all God's punishment, all wrath, all the cruelty of hell, all the right the devil had over us, because of sin, would be concentrated on Him as on a centre; because all sins had been gathered in Him and their abode, room and place was in Him.

#### Or as Luther says:

When the merciful Father threw the sins of all of us upon Him, He said: 'You will be what all human beings have been and are, from the beginning of time to its end. You will be the sinner who took the apple in paradise. You will be David, who committed adultery and murder. You will be Paul, who persecuted, blasphemed and was injurious, etc. In brief, you will be what all human beings are, as if you alone had done the sins of all of them. Therefore now think of how you will pay and make good for them.'



When thus the Mediator bore the sins of the world, all the curse of the Law also came over Him, that is, all the wrath of God, the disgrace and agony that the sins of all the world deserved. This fight started in the garden and it was so hard that it pressed the unheard-of sweat of blood from the strong Hero under prayer and tears as if from a weak, fainting sinner. God's law of imputing is no joke, but in deadly earnest. When God had once thrown the sin on Him, He could not even complain to God that He was

innocent, but He had to stand before the Father as a great sinner and taste all the curse of the Law.

This was completed in the death on the cross which comprised all the curse of the Law. Here, finally, Death had its battle with Life. Death is a mighty lord over all the world because he overcomes kings and princes and all men. With all his power, he now laid himself on Christ and wanted to overcome and devour Him, too. It even seemed that he succeeded therein, when, with strong crying and tears, the Lord gave up the ghost.

But, as in Him there was life eternal, so also, when He let Himself be overcome and killed, this eternal life turned back, overcame and killed death. By this innocent death of Christ for the sins of the world, the whole of the great victory was won, and thereby the head of the serpent was bruised. The Law had taken all its claim on mankind. Sin had been completely punished and atoned for. Death had been overcome by Life, and thereby the devil lost his prey. The accuser had been cast out and judged, and by the blood of the covenant the prisoners were sent forth out of the pit (Zechariah 9:11). For now an eternal pardon, life, freedom and righteousness had been earned for all, and angels and blessed multitudes sang the song of victory: Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power, be unto him that sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb. (Revelation 5:13) This is the glorious victory of which it is written: Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 15:54-57)

Thus by the glorious victory of Christ all the world has now been redeemed in Christ—as truly and as completely as it was fallen and lost in Adam. And undeservedly, it gets eternal life by Christ even as it had inherited sin and death by Adam. The Adamitic inheritance is something we feel within ourselves and the world at each moment. But the inheritance from Christ we do not see and feel. It is only preached by the Gospel and believed by us, but the Lord God sees Christ and His excellence. Therefore, as truly as you see the world sunk down in sin so equally truly does God see all human beings completely atoned for, justified and sanctified in Christ, yes, and as lovely as when in the beginning He saw everything that He had made, and, behold, it was very good.

If the world had not been restored thus before the eyes of God, then Christ would not have performed His office of atonement completely. Now there remains nothing else for our salvation and eternal bliss than the commandment of the Gospel: Kiss the Son! Come back, ye lost children. Come now, and let us reason together, saith the LORD: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow... (Isaiah 1:18) And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely. (Revelation 22:17) He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. (Mark 16:16) ~

Do these words bring you comfort, dear friend? The thought of Christ's return can strike fear into hearts of people who dwell in darkness and do not know the peace of God, who have not been brought into His kingdom of Light. Paul explains that the Day of the Lord will come suddenly, like a thief in the night. Some people delude themselves, saying, "It's all good! There is peace and safety here!" But like labor pains coming on a pregnant woman, there will be no escape. Christ will return, and sudden destruction will come upon those who do not believe that Jesus is the Savior of the world, the Son of God who has redeemed all of mankind from the power of darkness and sin.

Paul realizes this is a fearful thought to those who live in darkness, and he continues: "But you, brothers, are not in darkness. This Day won't surprise you!" Then these blessed words from the pen of the Apostle: Ye are all the children of light, and the children of the day: we are not of the night, nor of darkness.

Believers in Christ are transformed from darkness to light, from night to day, from death to Life. We give thanks to the Father who has made us fit to share in the inheritance of the saints in light. The Father has rescued us from the power of darkness, from Satan's realm, and has delivered us to the kingdom of His beloved Son. By the blood of Jesus, we have been redeemed and our sins have been forgiven (Colossians



1:12-14). Our heavenly Father has done this great work! He has translated us to His own kingdom of Light, and we share in the inheritance with the saints of light.

Because we are children of Light, we watch and wait, being aware of our surroundings and the temptations that can overwhelm us. We wear the breastplate of faith and love, and, on our heads, the helmet of the hope of salvation. God has not destined us to suffer His anger, but we receive salvation from our Lord Jesus, the Anointed One of God. He died and rose again to purchase us from sin, so that we can live with Him forever.

With Dr. Luther we say: We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and the Life everlasting. Whether we live or die, we are His, children of Light who will live with Him eternally. It's only a matter of time until the time comes, the archangel speaks, the trumpet sounds, and the Lord Himself descends to take us home. Be comforted by these words, children of Light. ~

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
# The Fourth Watch of the Night




And in the fourth watch of the night Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea. (Matthew 14:25)


