ur present-day society is focused on much learning and intellectual achievement. Education of itself is not evil, but man, in his pursuit of knowledge, seems so often to have lost sight of the most important thing in this life, namely, the intimate personal knowledge of Christ and the salvation He came to bring. This intimate knowledge of Christ differs greatly from the intellectual in that it is of the heart and not of the mind. The natural mind adheres to theory, reason and sight. The heart, on the other hand, clings by a childlike faith to those things which God's Word teaches. For with the heart man


believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. (Romans 10:10)

The church that Christ came to establish here on earth is commonly thought of as a beautiful sanctuary build of wood and stone, but God's Word teaches us that His true living Church is a spiritual Church, a spiritual body of believers with Christ as our head. The Apostle Paul writes, Christ is the head of the

church: and he is the saviour of the body. (Ephesians 5:23) All who believe as the Scripture teaches are members of Christ's spiritual body, the living Church. As the natural body cannot live without the head, neither can the Church remain alive without Christ as its head. So also, as the natural body cannot live without blood flowing freely throughout its members, so likewise the Church cannot live without the blood of Christ flowing throughout its members. Life, both natural and spiritual, is in the blood.

God's Word teaches that all have sinned and come short of the glory of God. The wages of sin is death... (Romans 6:23) Therefore, condemnation would be our eternal judgment. But we also read in the second part of that same verse ...but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus

entecost, meaning fiftieth day, was celebrated by the Jews as the Feast of Weeks, in which they commemorated the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai. Many people from many nations had gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate Pentecost. They were to witness the unveiling of the living Church of God, the birth of the New Testament Church.

On the day of Pentecost, a great change came to the Kingdom of God on earth. Jesus had already revealed the great power of God. He gave sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, caused the lame to walk, the lepers were cleansed, the dead were raised, and to the poor the Gospel was preached (Luke 7:22). He said, Many prophets and kings have desired to see those things which ye see, and have not seen them; and to hear those things which ye hear, and have not heard them. (Luke 10:24)

Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter replied, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Christ announced, "On this rock will I build my Church." He was not building it on Peter, but on his

confession that Jesus was the Christ. To this Church He promised great authority by giving the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. (Matthew 16:19)

Jesus didn't send His disciples out in their own power. He said, *Behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high.* (*Luke 24:49*) Though they had been with the most excellent teacher for three years, they needed heavenly power for the work that was before them.

On the day of Pentecost, the disciples were assembled in one accord when the Holy Spirit descended on them as a rushing mighty wind. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. (Acts 2:4) On this day, Jesus, who had ascended to the Father ten days earlier, fulfilled His promise of sending a counselor to teach them (John 14:26). Like the creative breath of God in Genesis, the Spirit filled the disciples, showing them how the Old Testament was fulfilled through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Peter had recently denied the Lord for fear. Now, Peter was no longer afraid but had received power from on high to boldly preach repentance and the forgiveness of sins. That day 3000 souls were saved, and they went on to turn the world "upside down" through the power of the Holy Spirit. It was clearly God's plan from the beginning

The Holy Spirit is the third person of the godhead, which proceeds from the Father and the Son. The work of the Holy Spirit is to reveal Christ. In a practical sense, the Holy Spirit is the living Lord Jesus within us as a Spirit. *I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me. (John 17:23)* As God is in Christ, Christ is in the Holy Spirit. Jesus said, Howbeit when *he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come. He shall glorify me: for he shall receive of mine, and shall shew it unto you. (John 16:13-14)* Jesus glorifies the Father, and the Holy Spirit glorifies the Son. The office of the Holy Spirit

> is **not** to speak of Himself. The Spirit shows us the truth found in God through Jesus Christ. The power of the Holy Spirit is where Jesus is lifted up. The first work of the Spirit is to awaken us to our sin and bring us to repentance. Then He reveals to us the

greatness of the living Lord Jesus, who has completed our redemption and reconciled the sins of the whole world with His blood. Our Pentecost begins when we are able to believe our sins forgiven in the name and blood of Jesus. Where the preaching of the blood is heard, there the power of the Holy Spirit is moving. The blood of Jesus is, from the fall of man to the end of the Revelation, a red cord that goes through the Bible. Through the Word, the Holy Spirit brings us into a union with God. Then the Spirit comes to live in us, to enlighten, sanctify and preserve us unto everlasting life. For our gospel came not unto you in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost... (1 Thessalonians 1:5)

The Church is an assembly of those on earth in whom God dwells through the Holy Spirit. God instituted His Church on earth to preach repentance and the forgiveness of sins to penitent sinners. The Church will continue here until the end of time and He will come again, just as He ascended, and receive us unto Himself.

he disciples could never recall the day of Pentecost without thinking about what they were before and what they were after the day had passed! The same is true for every one born of the Spirit. Has this miracle happened to you?

May we pray as Luther, "May God, our Father, through Christ Jesus, send the Holy Spirit into our hearts, there to begin and to complete the work of salvation!"

Clothes

Grace to you and peace from God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

t. Peter says in his first letter, chapter 5, to be clothed with humility for God resists the proud and gives grace to the humble. In light of this passage of God's Word let's talk about clothes: We all know about clothes and what type of clothing we like best. Now here's a question for you: What were the first clothes made of?

Genesis 3 says that after Adam and Eve disobeyed God they were ashamed and sewed clothes of fig leaves. Our first parents' attempt to cover their bodies was rejected by God, but after He warned them of the terrible things they would suffer because of sin, He gave the promise of the Savior and made them coats of skins to cover their shame. From this let's look at two things:

- Clothes are a constant reminder of sin.
- Clothes picture our perfect righteousness in Christ.

1. Clothes are a constant reminder of sin. Before Adam and Eve sinned there were no clothes. Whenever we dress, it reminds us of how our first parents sinned and had to be covered. Before sin there was perfect weather; in the Garden of Eden there was no need for clothes to protect from the biting frost or the scorching sun. There were no thorns and thistles poking and scratching, no poisonous plants or angry bees stinging, no venomous snakes or ferocious animals to be afraid of, no thirsty insects sucking blood from our tender bodies. Nor was it necessary to carefully hide our private parts from the lustful eyes of fellow sinners. Since the fall, clothing is a continual reminder of sin.

2. Clothes picture our perfect righteousness in Christ. Animals had to die for God to get skins to cover Adam and Eve. So God gave His Son to the bitter death of the cross to cover our sin. Baptism pictures putting Christ Himself on as a covering for our sins as we read in *Galatians 3:27: For as* many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ. Throughout our whole life it pictures the putting off of the "old man" or old life of sin and the putting on the "new man" or Christ as we read in Ephesians 4:22-24: That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness.


The next day John seeth Jesus coming unto him, and saith, Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world.

The Acceptable Churches

n reading the Revelation of St. John the Divine in Scripture, it is interesting to note, in the letters to the seven churches, the two churches which God finds acceptable. As we find throughout the teachings of Scripture, what God thinks and what man thinks seem to be so contrary one to the other. The ways that man might go and the teachings he may embrace are not always acceptable to God, as we see in five of the churches. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the LORD. (Isaiah 55:8) Perhaps there are some things we can learn of the blessed state of the two acceptable churches:

And unto the angel of the church in Smyrna write; These things saith the first and the last, which was dead, and is alive; I know thy works, and *tribulation*, and *poverty*, (but thou art rich)... be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death. (Revelation 2:8-11)

To the angel of the church in Philadelphia write; These things saith he that is holy, he that is true, he that hath the key of David, he that openeth, and no man shutteth; and shutteth, and no man openeth; I know thy works: behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it: for thou hast a *little strength*, and hast *kept my word*, and hast *not denied my name*... Because thou hast *kept the word of my patience*, I also will keep thee from the hour of temptation, which shall come upon all the world, to try them that dwell upon the earth. (Revelation 3:7-8, 10)

We find this poverty or little strength spoken of in the Beatitudes: Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. (Matthew 5:3) Also, Isaiah 66:2: ...but to this man will I look, even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembleth at my word. See also Isaiah 61:1-3.

In the message to the church of Laodicea, which was one of the churches in error, John writes: *Because thou sayest*, *I am rich*, *and increased with goods*, *and have need of nothing*; *and knowest not that thou art wretched*, *and miserable*, *and poor*, *and blind*, *and naked*. (*Revelation 3:17*) It would

appear that the Laodicean church was rich in their own good works and a sense of being self-satisfied and not in need of Christ's righteousness to cover their sins.

In the Gospel of Matthew we find the miracles which Christ performed being told to John the Baptist in prison: The blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them. (Matthew 11:5)

It is a blessed thing when the Spirit of God can work in our hearts and reveal the poorness that is there, revealing the true condition of the human heart and how we fail in many things that God would want us to do and be, though we would want it to be otherwise. When we are burdened with our weaknesses and sins we can find Christ within our brother or sister in faith, and as a member of the Royal Priesthood he/she can assure us of Christ's forgiveness in His name and cleansing blood. We are then strengthened to go forward. Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith... (Hebrews 12:1-2)

We can find comfort in what Apostle Paul laments: For that which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I. If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law that it is good. Now then it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) **dwelleth no good thing**: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not. For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me. For I delight in the law of God after the inward man: But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin. (Romans 7:15-25)

It is because of this knowledge of the weakness of our flesh and depravity of our nature that our only hope is to look to Christ. When we have received by faith the comfort of the Gospel, the forgiveness of our sins, proclaimed in the name and precious blood of Christ, how we can rejoice in Him as our Savior! **He** is our Goodness, our Righteousness, our Perfection and all that we are not! **He** intercedes in our behalf before the Father in heaven. Who shall lay any thing to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather, that is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession for us. (Romans 8:33-34)

He is our Goodness, our Righteousness, our Perfection and all that we are not! He intercedes in our behalf before the Father in heaven.

There remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God. For he that is entered into his rest, he also hath ceased from his own works, as God did from his. Let us labour therefore to enter into that rest, lest any man fall after the same example of unbelief. (Hebrews 4:9-11) In Christ we have our heart's rest and our peace, when He has forgiven us our sins and we rest in His righteousness. Our hearts are filled with joy and thankfulness for all that our Savior has done for us. This knowledge we then want to share with others. May God give us hearts of love to the saving of the lost. ~
